Fruit Muffins for Quick, Tasty Luncheon Bread

Muffins made with fruit are a popular hot bread for early fall menus. And no more delicious muffin could one want than an Apple-sauce Muffin with all the tantalizing flavor of new apples in every bite.

Sweet muffins combine perfectly with saled plate lunches or light food. They double equally well as dessert. The crisp, generous portion of golden brown crust gives them an extra share of oven-fresh sweetness without using much of that precious sugar ration.

Muffin making has a special warm weather advantage, for it makes short work of kitchen time. Muffins may be mixed and in the oven in

a jiffy. The homemaker whose family likes to eat its muffins with golden butter or fortified margarine melting on every crumb has no problem when she uses a double-acting baking powder. She can mix her muffins before dinner and place her muffin pans in the refrigerator. Then, just before the family is ready to sit down at the table she can place them in the oven to rise to feathery heights.

APPLESAUCE MUFFINS

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup corn syrup

- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup applesauce
- 2 cups sifted enriched flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup chopped nuts

Cream shortening and sugar together. Add syrup and beat well. Add beaten eggs. Add applesauce. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together and add to creamed mixture, stirring only enough to moisten flour. Add nuts. Bake in greased muffin pans in moderate oven (375° F.) 20 to 25 minutes.
 Yield: 2 1/2 dozen muffins.
