Moser and his wife represent the highest consecration in missionary endeavor and have been separated, due to health reasons and war conditions, for some years past. They have been working under the Foreign Mission Board of the Presbyterian church, U. S. A. Mrs. Moser was formerly Miss Edna Dunbar. It is hoped that their many friends will avail themselves of this opportunity to hear him in this informal evening meeting.
