Salem Lads Big, Tough On Gridiron

Pelican Coach Fails to Scout Enemy; But Gathers Plenty Second-hand Dope

Reports of plenty of beef among Salem's Vikings are not exaggerated, it was apparent when the large lads from the capital arrived here last night for their game tonight with Frank Ramsey's Pelicans.

The Salem lads loomed big on the street and will probably look even bigger when they take the field against the Pelicans, who are nevertheless favored to win their third start of the 1943 grid season.

The visitors have been doing a lot of practicing this week for their battle with the touted Pelicans. Coach Tommy Drynan worked his charges four long hours each afternoon for what he told them will be their toughest game of the season.

Cochran Ramsey of the Pelicans has gathered considerable information about the Vikes and has imparted it to his lads, but he hasn't seen them in action. Frank was given a bum tip last weekend that Salem would play Milwaukee on Saturday instead of Friday night, and here is the story as related by Al Lightner in the Salem Statesman.

Cal Football Hocus-Pocus To Be Bared

Southern California's T-formation Pitted Against Bears' Unseen Grid Tactics

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 1 (AP)—Southern California's newly installed and apparently effective T-formation will be pitted against California's widely heralded but unseen to date football hocus pocus Saturday at Berkeley in the chief attraction of the abbreviated coast gridiron schedule.

The Trojans showed no shortage of talent while racing off to a 20-0 win over the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins last week. USC already established 10-8 favorites to knock over the California Bears. The Bears overpowered the St. Mary's college Gaels in their opener 27-12 and were not forced to use deceptive plays they are known to possess, much to the disappointment of Trojan scouts.

If the contest goes to a decision it will establish a leader among the three members composing the Southern division of the conference. USC already is in front, from the win over UCLA. And it will be the first conference contest for the Bears. The three rivals play home and home engagements this season.

A crowd of more than 30,000 is expected for the Berkeley game. UCLA entertains College of the Pacific in Los Angeles and in spite of the loss to Southern California, is expected to take the field slightly favored to beat Amos Alonzo Stagg's twice victorious Tigers. Pacific already has won from the favored coast guard and the St. Mary's navy pre-flight school but will suit up tomorrow minus the services of some regulars, three injured and one ineligible.

YOU PICK 'EM

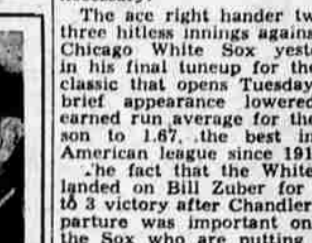

Hunters Invade Oregon Woods as Deer Hunt Opens

PORTLAND, Oct. 1 (AP)—Hundreds of hunters entered Oregon forests today for the opening of the deer season. State game officials estimated more than 145,000 would participate before the season ends November 3. Final figures on hunting licenses have not been reported yet.

Hunters were warned by forest officials of the fire danger, and several sections remained closed. These included a 30,000-acre area in the Fremont National forest in Wheeler county and sections of state forests in Klamath, Lake, Jackson, Coos, Douglas and Josephine counties.
