

KLAMATH FSA HOMEMAKERS CAN TOMATOES

A group of 12 Klamath county FSA homemakers and their friends canned 1800 No. 24 cans of tomatoes at the Grants Pass community cannery this week and last week, it was announced Friday from the FSA office.

The women went to Grants Pass under the supervision of Mrs. Marjorie Brissenden, FSA home management supervisor here, and Mrs. Sara Wertz, home management supervisor of Grants Pass. The 24 ton of tomatoes used by the 12 homemakers had already been purchased from a nearby grower, and the tin cans used were furnished by the community cannery at a small cost to the persons using them.

Average cost per can totaled approximately 14c, this amount including transportation costs. Quality of the finished product is unusually high, Mrs. Brissenden said, and if the canned tomatoes were to be sold, they would be branded fancy and sold pack. Retail prices on this quality of canned tomatoes would be from 6c to 10c per can higher in a store.

Besides the low cost, an additional advantage of canning where the crop is actually grown, is that it is probable that an outstanding amount of vitamin C for which tomatoes are valuable, is conserved when the tomatoes are canned with a minimum shipping and exposure to air and heat.

At the cannery the twelve women canned an average of 150 quarts each in an average of 6 to 7 hours. The building and equipment at Grants Pass, according to Mrs. Brissenden, is particularly efficient due to the fact that it is a former commercial cannery, which has been closed since 1941. The community cannery is sponsored by the Oregon State Department of Vocational Education with Walter G. Carpenter, Smith Hughes agriculture instructor at the Grants Pass high school, in charge.

KLAMATH MAN DEPLORES DOE KILLING RULE

An appeal to Governor Snell to prevent a repetition next year of the legal killing of doe deer went to Salem this week from J. B. Reed, 535 Jefferson street, Klamath Falls.

Reed criticized the game commission for a policy he said is bringing about "systematic destruction" of deer in the Fremont forest area. He endorsed a recent suggestion in a Herald and News letter from P. S. Puckett that sportsmen refuse to use doe tags, buying them and framing them instead.

The Klamath man in his letter argued that doe killing destroys a source of meat supply for the civilian population and reduces the chance that returning soldiers will find good hunting in this region.

He said that the policy of the game commission this year will "almost decimate the breeding stock in the Fremont area." He said the commission is supposed to be a conservation commission but our sportsmen here regard it as a "game destroying commission."

"It is apparently too late for you to take action this year, but I sincerely trust that you will use your influence to stop the destruction of what deer are left in the Fremont forest next year," Reed said to the governor.

BUYERS GET CHOOSY ON SLOW MARKET

NEW YORK, Oct. 2 (AP)—It was another of those selective markets today, so far as stock buyers were concerned, and leaders generally shifted over a slightly uneven terrain.

While fractional gainers were to be found in most departments near the close, small losses were plentiful. Transfers for the two hours of around 250,000 shares were among the smallest for the year to date.

Wall street was cheered by the over-subscription of the third war loan.

Stocks in front at intervals included U. S. Steel, Chrysler, U. S. Rubber, Western Union, N. Y. Central, Standard Oil (N.J.), Johns-Manville and Allied Chemical.

Among backward performers were Bethlehem, Santa Fe, Texas Co., Sears Roebuck, General Motors, Goodrich, International Harvester, Kennecott, DuPont and J. C. Penney.

Bonds were narrow and major commodities a shade lower.
