

Soroptimists Hear Dr. Adams

Club Members Enjoy Talk by Flight Surgeon at Meeting Held Thursday at Noon

Many varied and interesting experiences in the life of a flight surgeon were recounted by Major Martin Adams for the Soroptimist club at its weekly luncheon held at the Pelican party room Thursday.

In the battle of Tunis, the planes in Major Adams' unit brought in about 20,000 wounded for treatment. The good medical care given our men and the rapidity of getting the wounded back to proper hospitalization are factors that have helped cut down fatalities, according to Major Adams. Head injuries which used to have a 50% to 80% fatality have been cut to twelve to fourteen percent.

After the Tunisian campaign, Major Adams' unit started practicing dropping paratroops at night. When the Sicilian invasion started, a bad storm and poor navigation caused the planes to miss their scheduled spot by eight miles. This proved a fortunate error, for the Germans had been tipped off as to the landing spot and were waiting at the spot the boys missed.

Major Adams left Sicily for Klamath Falls two days after Italy surrendered. His trip took eight days but only sixty-three actual hours of flying time.

Some interesting sidelights recounted by Major Adams were that he spent four months in England but saw the sun only five days during that time. On reaching Africa from England the boys found oranges and eggs plentiful and that soldiers would eat three and four dozen oranges without stopping; eggs were two for a penny at first but the Arabs soon got wise, and the stories on the terrible swarms of flies were not exaggerated.

Major Adams' address to the club was the high-light of the week designated to celebrate the birth of Soroptimism which took place twenty-two years ago in Oakland, California. The Soroptimist club of Klamath Falls, which was chartered in June 1938, is an integral part of this vast and important organization of professional and business executives. There are now one hundred seventy-one clubs in the American Federation of Soroptimist clubs, which includes clubs in the United States and Canada and ninety-two clubs in Great Britain and Ireland. All are now participating in the all-out war service, one important phase being the material aid given for the training of student nurses in China, the Klamath Falls club having financed the training for twenty-two.

Mrs. E. D. Lamb, representing the Woman's Library club, will talk on the Homemakers.

Lieutenant Betty Herring of the armed forces; Mrs. Harlan Bosworth, Jr., representing the League of Women Voters, will talk on legislation, and Mrs. Joana Givens, representing the BPW club, will discuss education.

National Business Women's week has been a national institution for several years. The first observance was held in 1928, when Emma Dot Partidge was executive secretary of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Inc., then with 874 clubs and 50,000 members. The idea was hers, and the purpose was to review, dramatize and inspire the contribution of business and professional women to the economic, social and political life of the country.

Down through the years the focus has changed as the world has changed. Today the Federation has about 1700 clubs, and 73,000 members organized in every state in the nation, the District of Columbia, Alaska and Hawaii. The purpose of National Business Women's week in 1948 is to emphasize the leadership of women in business and the professions in solving the problems of "Living on the Home Front."

The new problems of daily living resulting from the war are so confusing, so complex, that only trained minds and far-sighted orderly procedures can solve them. This is the main reason in which trained women can help win the war.

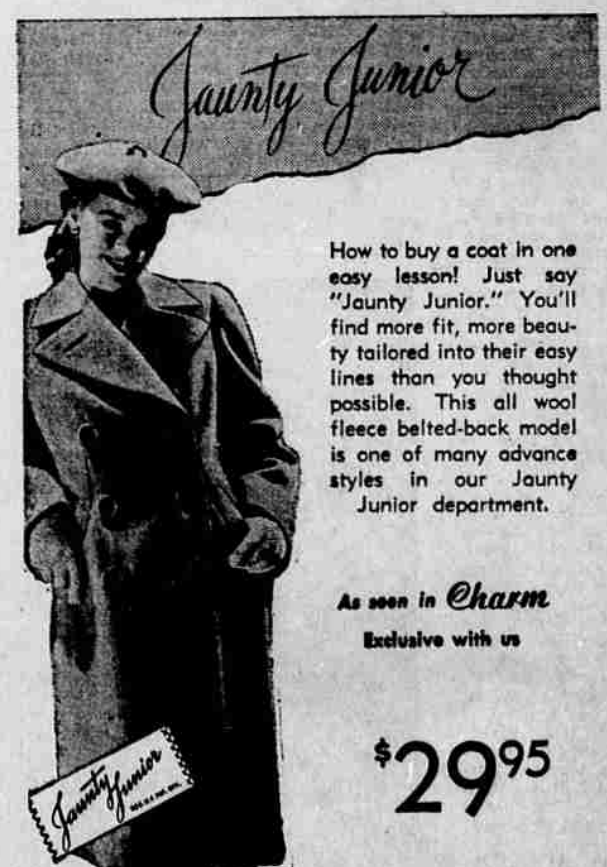
