Miss Pearl Hall, who has lived in Mexico City from time to time, spoke informally of her impressions of Mexico and her Spanish teacher, Mrs. Estefania D. de Chavez, at the home of Mrs. Edward MacKay, Saturday, September the twenty-fifth. Miss Hall stressed the importance of promoting better relations between the United States and Mexico as a means of preventing further German interference there. She spoke of her Spanish instructor, an outstanding teacher, who is hired by the consulate to give lessons free in Los Angeles as a means of increasing our understanding of the country.
