He THEN adds: "The whole German air force IS NOW almost entirely without reserves and is a SHELL which may be near the cracking point."

**IN Italy**, we've smashed the Germans' Gustav line and are hammering at the southern end and the center of their Hitler line (lying just behind the Gustav).

Our high command at Naples says today: "U. S. and French blows (at the Gustav) have forced the Germans into a DISORDERLY RETREAT instead of a planned withdrawal to their present line (the Hitler) in Italy."

For confirmation of that, watch the prisoner totals (as and when they are given out.) Whenever the Germans are forced into disorderly retreat, the prisoner totals will go up.

**THE Germans** today bomb Russian communications and concentrations in central Poland. They aren't wasting precious gasoline just for the fun of it. They have reason to believe the Russians are MASSING FOR ATTACK there.

**TODAY'S dispatches** tell us that strong Fifth army REVERSE forces are MASSING AND WAITING at Anzio. Your map will tell you they're waiting to hit the Germans from the flank and the rear at the psychological moment.

**THE London Daily Mail** says today the Germans have massed gliders and transport planes in concealed hangars along the European coast in sufficient numbers to drop at least one airborne DIVISION on Britain.
