

TULELAKE JAP KILLS SELF IN HOSPITAL WARD

NEWELL—Sadaharu Seino, 17, bachelor resident of the Tulelake center, was found hanging by a sling made from torn strips of his overalls early Friday morning in ward X of the project hospital.

He was administered artificial respiration and a heart stimulant which failed to revive him and Seino was pronounced dead at 12:50 a. m. He was found shortly after midnight.

About 3 p. m. Thursday, Seino had swallowed the contents of a bottle of lysol which he had purchased from the cooperative canteen. He was later removed to the hospital where his stomach was pumped out. A search of his apartment made by WRA police revealed two notes in Japanese, indicating intention of suicide. His roommates said he had been despondent for some time. In one of these notes, Seino asked to be remembered to his friends in Marysville, Calif.

Deputy Coroner Buck Seaver of Modoc county was called by the WRA. This is the first suicide since January 1, 1944.

A \$45,000 damage suit against Ewauna Box company ended Thursday morning in circuit court with the granting of a motion by the defense for involuntary nonsuit. The motion was granted by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg at the close of a civil jury trial lasting two and a half days.

The damage suit was filed some time ago against the lumber company by Thomas J. Annereau, administrator of the estate of Ralph T. Woods, deceased. Woods, according to court testimony was found dead about a year ago at his work, while employed by Ewauna.

At the end of the two and a half days' testimony, Circuit Judge Vandenberg granted the motion for non-suit and dismissed the jury on several grounds, one of which being that the plaintiffs had failed to prove the cause of Wood's death or that his death had come about through any negligence on the part of the lumber company.

Attorneys for the plaintiff were Ben Anderson of Portland and J. C. O'Neill and the defense attorney was Richard B. Maxwell.

FDR NOMINATES 2 FOR PROMOTION

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—Two of the men who have directed some of the heaviest blows against the Japanese in the Pacific were nominated today by President Roosevelt for higher ranks for the duration of the war.

Vice Admiral Marc A. Mitscher, who directed aerial activity in the Solomons during hottest phases of the campaign there was nominated for promotion to the rank which he now holds on a temporary basis.

Hitscher, who was last reported commanding a task force in the Pacific, was skipper of the aircraft carrier Hornet when planes took off from her decks to bomb Tokyo.

Rear Adm. John H. Hoover who commanded air forces in the successful invasion of the Marshall islands was nominated also for a duration rank of rear admiral.

Mitscher, born in Hillsboro, Wis., now maintains his official residence at Oklahoma City. Hoover, a native of Seville, O., has his official residence in Great Falls, Mont.

Peacetime Success of Wood To Alcohol Process Hinges On Sale, Use of Lignin

Ethyl alcohol, high protein yeast and sugar from wood have been much in the news recently, culminating in the proposal to build a 400-ton daily capacity conversion plant at Springfield, Ore. According to people who should know, the cost of producing alcohol from wood by the Scholler process is of the order of 20 cents a gallon, although estimates vary from about 18 to 25 cents. That from grain is more expensive, that from molasses is cheaper. Alcohol can also be made from petroleum but what the costs are, I do not know. Under war-time demands, when costs are apparently of no consequence, alcohol from wood is probably entirely practical. Under peace-time demands, alcohol from blackstrap molasses probably would put alcohol from wood out of business, unless over-all demands for ethyl alcohol greatly exceeded those of pre-war days, and thus kept prices above cost of production from wood.

Other factors than direct cost of alcohol by itself, however, might affect the picture. Let's examine the Scholler process for a moment. Wood of almost any species is chipped and run through a grinder. A weak solution of sulphuric acid under rather critical conditions of temperature and pressure is percolated over these chips for some hours, resulting in conversion of the cellulose in the wood to a watery solution of glucose. This glucose is used as a feeding medium for yeast, that is, it is fermented, after which the resultant alcohol is separated by distillation. If stock food is required rather than alcohol, selected strains of high protein yeast are employed and the yeast then used for feed.

After conversion, there is left in the converters nearly half the original weight of the wood in the form of rather finely divided lignin plus a small amount of unconverted cellulose and varying percentages of other materials. It is in this residue that the ultimate commercial success of alcohol from wood apparently lies. Again I am told by experts in the process, that if as much as 2 cents a pound could be realized for the lignin, it would pay for the process and income from alcohol would be all velvet.

What then, are the possibilities of utilizing lignin? Many, but almost without exception they are still just "over the horizon." Plastics appear to be the best bet, but those made from lignin, to date, seem to lack some of the desirable properties found in other plastic materials. Some use has been made of lignin in road binders, but so far as I know, no one has proposed a use that would pay 2 cents a pound for lignin in the enormous quantities in which it would be available if we made sizeable quantities of ethyl alcohol. The ultimate commercial success of ethyl alcohol from wood, therefore, would seem to hinge on lignin research. (Tomorrow—Compregnated Wood)

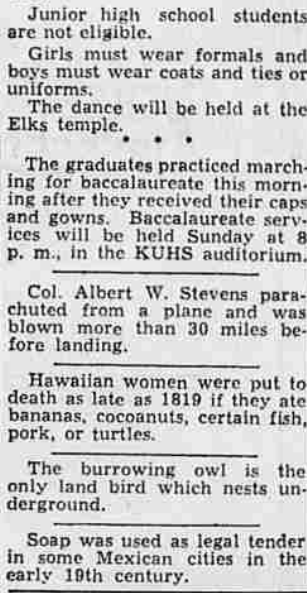
