PORTLAND, May 19 (P)—Cheating is common in college classrooms—and it's heaviest among students interested in politics, Dr. Frank W. Parr told a businessmen's club here.

The executive secretary of the Oregon State Teachers' association said a five-year survey among Oregon State college students revealed that 42 per cent admitted cheating at some time.
