PIONEER LAKE COUNTY WOMAN DIES MONDAY

Mrs. Fred Foster, 73-year-old pioneer of Summer Lake, Lake county, who made her home for 63 years in southern Oregon, died at 1:45 p. m. Monday in a Pendleton hospital. She had undergone major surgery and failed to recover. Mrs. Foster was visiting at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Carl M. Ewing, at the time.

Born Ada McDowell, daughter of John and Flavia McDowell in Iron county, Missouri, in the year 1868, the child came west with her mother and her grandparents, Zadok and Melissa Harris in 1881. John McDowell had died when Ada was four years old. The Harris family settled in the Summer Lake valley and had some of the record-setting operations with marine assault units on Parry Island, part of Eniwetok atoll in the Marshall islands. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. F. House, live at 1914 Etna street.

In 1887, Ada McDowell and Fred W. Foster were married and Foster operated a stock ranch for many years at the Edge of Summer Lake. He died in 1936. Mrs. Flavia McDowell, one of the best known women of Lake county, died in 1932. Mrs. Foster was an active member of the Methodist church.

Mrs. and Mrs. Foster had four children. A son, Harold, died at March Field, Calif., in 1918 while serving in World War I. Surviving are Mrs. Ruby Ewing of Pendleton, Mrs. Carmel Hartin of Klamath Falls and a son, Guy, of Summer Lake. Mrs. Foster was the sister of Mrs. W. B. (Ava) Barnes, 324 S. 5th, Klamath Falls, and spent the winter here with the Barnes family. Five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren also survive.

Funeral services will be held at Summer Lake with interment in the family plot. The time will be announced later.

FARM MACHINERY PROBE UNDERWAY

WASHINGTON, May 23 (AP)—A start was called today for a senate investigation of the farm machinery situation, with Senator Bushfield (R-S.D.) asking an official explanation of a report that equipment sorely needed here has been "gathering dust" in north African warehouses for a year.

Bushfield said a civilian government official, stationed in North Africa, had told him of seeing "two big warehouses filled with new American-made combines and other farm machinery which had been in storage for at least a year."

Needed Here
"This was at a time when farmers in this country were crying for combines to harvest their crops," Bushfield said. "Farmers haven't got a third of the machinery they need." The extent to which farm machinery has been shipped to other nations through lend-lease and the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administration is one of the chief points to be covered in the inquiry, to be conducted by an agriculture subcommittee under the chairmanship of Senator Gillette (D-Ia.). Bushfield is a member.

Gillette said the investigation would look especially into the possibility of increased allotments of materials for machinery manufacture. War food administration and war production board officers were listed as the first witness.
