French Patriots Told How To Help Allied Invaders

LONDON, May 24 (AP) — The allies adopted a firm military approach today in summoning French patriots to get ready for their role when D-day dawns, while in this island the disposing of troops and assembling of fleets for the western invasion went forward steadily.

The government-controlled British Broadcasting corporation told French patriots that instructions — similar to those from the supreme headquarters of the American expeditionary force — would be given them regularly.

"It is no longer a question of voluntary service," BBC bluntly informed the underground, "it now is an order to you."

"You are to keep out of German hands and hold yourselves in readiness for the day of action. That is the duty of every Frenchman."

Early today there was gunfire in the strait of Dover, which soon may respond to the clamor of the invasion battle. British big guns opened up a thundering barrage, presumably aimed at a German convoy seeking to slip through the channel. German guns on the French coast answered sporadically from Calais, Cap Gris Nez and Boulogne. British salvos lit up many miles of the coast for half an hour.

Mattoon Takes Four North to Serve Sentences

Two men and two juvenile boys, in custody of Deputy Sheriff Dale Mattoon, Tuesday were taken north, both of the men to begin serving three-year sentences in the Oregon state penitentiary at Salem, and the juveniles to be placed in the Oregon state training school at Woodburn.

The two men were Frank Williams, recently convicted by a jury of contributing to the delinquency of a minor and Neil Allen, who pleaded guilty to a grand larceny charge, involving the stealing of three Klamath cars all in one day several weeks ago.
