

RECREATION SWIM PLANS SCHEDULED

An excellent summer recreation program has been outlined by Dave Bridge, city recreation director, with a detailed swimming schedule included in the season's plans.

The swimming program has been made possible by officials of Klamath Union high school, city recreation committee and the school board, Bridge said. The pool has been turned over to the recreation department for use during the coming summer months and the program will start May 29. It will run five days per week, Monday through Friday, from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. Instructors certified by the American Red Cross will handle all classes.

Youngsters must bring a towel, suit and five cents. Suits will be rented for 10 cents to those not having them.

The recreation committee and director hope that the parents will encourage their children to attend the swimming program, as well as the other activities in the summer schedule.

The facilities of KUHS and Mills school will be available for children on June 12. Arts, crafts, shop and physical activities will highlight the program. Any further information in regards to the swimming or recreation program can be had by phoning the recreation office, 7112.

Any boy or girl swimming on Monday, Wednesday and Friday of one week will swim on Tuesday and Thursday of the following week. The ones swimming on Tuesday and Thursday will swim on Monday, Wednesday and Friday the following week.

CHRISTIAN, JEW CHAPTER TALKED

Representatives of various religious groups in Klamath Falls, interested in the National Conference of Christians and Jews, met to discuss the possibility of organizing a chapter in this city. The meeting was held at noon Wednesday in the Pelican with Rev. Eugene V. Haynes of the Community Congregational church presiding.

Rev. Haynes was selected as the convenor for future meetings. Present at the luncheon was Rev. Raymond B. Walker of Portland, pastor of the First Congregational church, who has been vitally interested and active in the Oregon chapter of the National Conference of Christians and Jews since its inception in 1928. The conference was organized by former Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes, Dr. S. Parks Cadman and Newton D. Baker, former secretary of war.

Purpose of the conference is to advance the ideals of justice, a better understanding, goodwill and cooperation among Protestants, Catholics and Jews.

Bloodsue and Bill Greenley were paddling across the river in an old boat after swimming with a group of other boys when the boat sank. It was the first drowning in this area this season. The body was recovered in 30 minutes by firemen.
