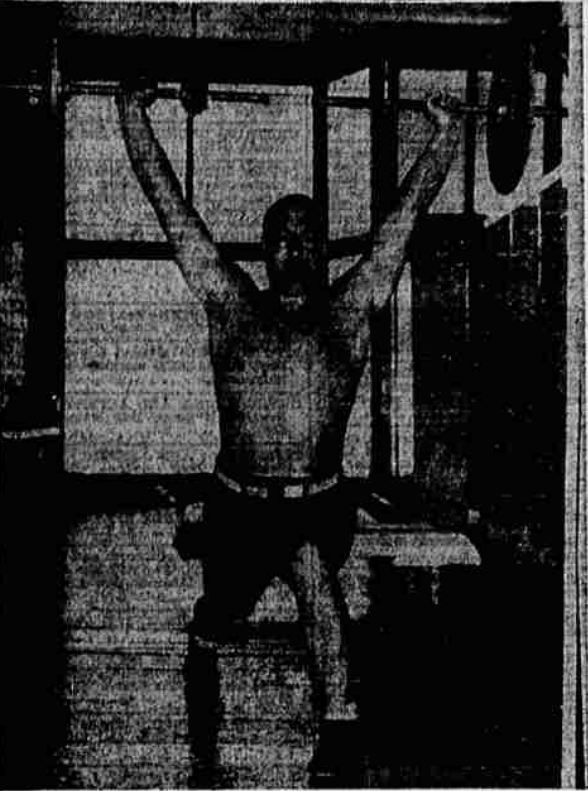
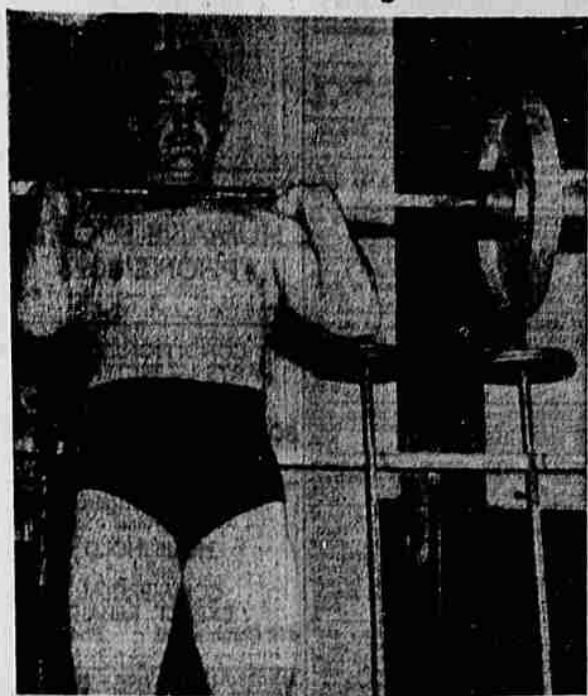
DIES OF FALL

Great Lakes Has Bigtime Baseball Squad in Making

GREAT LAKES, Ill., May 25 (AP)—There's no room for another major league baseball team and naval rules forbid, but many experts and fans are of the opinion that a 17th big time squad is operating this season—at the Great Lakes naval training center.

Most of the 22 young sailors at the world's biggest naval station on the bluejacket roster wouldn't be strangers in major league uniforms—for 17 of them were playing in the National and American league last season. The remaining five were on top minor league clubs in 1943.

For the third successive year, Lt. Mickey Cochrane has fielded an entirely new team. Many baseball experts agree this season's squad isn't going to be pushed around by any opposition, including the big league clubs. The bluejackets have won their first six games, including victories over the Philadelphia Phillies and the Boston Red Sox. The bluejackets in 1943 won 52 of their 63 games but only 32 contests are scheduled this season, including eleven against big league teams.

Cochrane, whose American league career included managing Detroit, has an infield composed of former National leaguers—Johnny McCarthy, Boston, first; Billy Herman, Brooklyn, second; Merrill May, Phillies, third, and Al Glossop, Dodgers, shortstop. Outfielders are Gene Wooding, Cleveland; Dick West, Cincinnati; and Mizell Platt, Chicago Cubs, with Schoolboy Rowe, who pitched in both big leagues.

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Ducks Down 6 Pitchers; Blast Stars

Beavers Top Hollywood, 15-9; Even South Series At One All; Seattle Down

The Hollywood Stars used up a total of six pitchers last night in a vain effort to stop the league leading Portland Beavers as they blasted their way to a 15 to 9 Pacific Coast Baseball league victory to even the series at one-all.

Incidentally, the Beavers set the pace for all other losers of Tuesday night's series openers with the result all four series were tied today.

Portland scored one in the second inning and three more in the fourth before putting on the clincher with a mighty six-run rally in the fifth. The Stars out-hit the Beavers 16 to 14, but couldn't cash in on the blows.

Seattle lost out in its virtual tie for second place in the league standings with San Francisco when Henry Steinbacher, Seal left fielder came to life after going hitless his last 20 times at bat and singled in two runs in the eighth inning. Joe Demoran, Seattle ace, had a one to nothing advantage from the fourth inning on in his pitching battle with Seals' Tom Seals until Steinbacher connected.

The Oakland A's, who won from the Sacramento Solons in 14 innings Tuesday, pushed their game out to 11 innings last night before going down to a 2 to 1 defeat. The Solons collected on an eleventh inning single by Forrest Rogers who hit with the bases full.

The Los Angeles Angels likewise won on a late inning single when Reggie Otero tripled and went home on Buy Miller's single in the eighth, giving the Angels a two-run advantage and an eventual 5-4 victory after San Diego scored one in the last of the same inning.

DUAL MEET

SAN FRANCISCO, May 25 (AP) Turf talk: Pensive, winner of the Kentucky Derby and the Preakness and Twilight Tear, under the foisted mare, are king and queen of the 3-year-olds this season, so far, but some horsemen out this way are still withholding judgment until one or the other, or both, of those stars match strides with the western-bred thunderbolt, Sirde. . . .

This may be less majestic than the part of the westerners' bet cause the Calumet Farm's flyer had done everything asked of them, and the Derby and Preakness wins give Pensive a two- thirds claim to the 3-year-old championship title. . . . Sirde also has done a bit of running, notably this season so much as last season not even over distance, yet the black colt has shown such possibilities that followers think he will hold its own in the strongest competition. . . . It has won seven out of 12 starts. . . .

Sirde, owned and trained by Allen Drumheller of Walla Walla, Wash., is by the Italian-German stallion, Mio d'Arezzo and its dam is Risky Miss, once a fast six furlongs mare. . . . Risky Miss is by Chance Play whose father was Fair Play and Fair Play sired Man o' War. . . . Mio d'Arezzo also sired Midland, fourth in the Kentucky Derby in 1940; second in the Preakness and winner of the American Derby last year. . . . Sirde, therefore, is high society in the breeding ranks. . . .

Races over a distance, except a one mile test, are lacking from Sirde's record, therefore comparisons are impossible with the kingpin, Pensive. . . . The westerner packed 122 pounds and ran second to Autocrat, 114, in a mile earlier this year at Bay Meadows. . . . Over six furlongs, last November, Sirde beat Autocrat by one and one-half lengths and last year also he whipped Shut Up at the three-quarters of a mile distance. . . . Shut Up took fourth in the recent Kentucky Derby. . . .

Sirde will be shipped to the Chicago meetings soon and while not eligible for the American Derby or the Arlington classic will be entered in a couple of \$10,000 stakes at Washington Park. . . . He may buck up against Pensive and Broadcloth in these events.
