Mrs. Herman Lofdahl, for 13 years a resident of Klamath Falls and active in veteran organizations, died at Hillside hospital at 4:45 p. m. Wednesday following a brief illness. Mrs. Lofdahl, 42 years of age at the time of her passing, had been in good health until Tuesday evening when she suffered a heart attack.

Gladys M. E. Lofdahl was born in Denver, Colo. With her family she moved to Klamath Falls in 1931. She has served as past president of Disabled Veterans, chapter 12; was president of the auxiliary to the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Pelican Post, at the time of her passing, and sergeant in the Oregon Women's Ambulance corps.

In addition to her husband, Herman, Mrs. Lofdahl is survived by three sons, Pvt. Herman N., U. S. army, Camp Maxey, Tex., Pvt. William E., U. S. army, Camp Crowder, Mo., and LeRoy J., of Klamath Falls. Final rites will be held from Ward's chapel Friday, May 26, at 8 p. m. with Rev. J. M. Langset of the Klamath Lutheran church in charge. Mrs. Lofdahl was a member of the Lutheran church, Ladies of the VFW auxiliary will assist in the services.
