Deepest sympathy is extended to the family of Glen Fields, who was killed in action in the South Pacific. Glen had many friends in Langell valley.

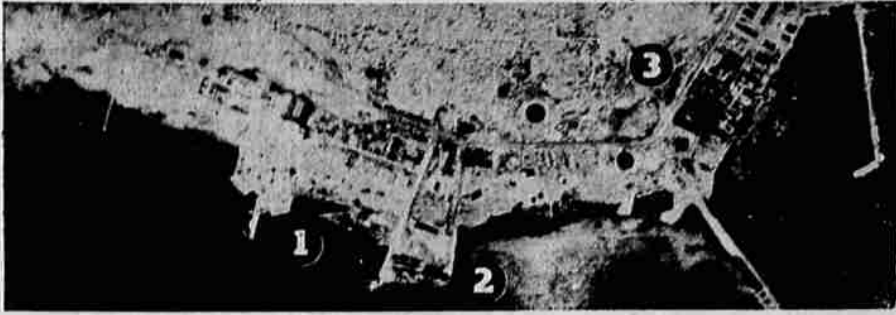

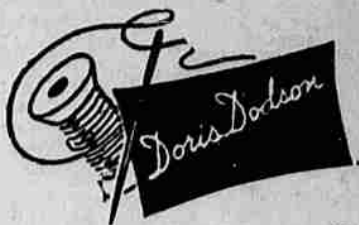
