NEW EVENING RADIO CLASS TO BE STARTED

A new evening radio class will start soon, to be continued through the summer months. It was announced this week by L. L. Erdmann, in charge of the national defense vocational schools which are being conducted for anyone interested, at the Klamath Union high school. The radio class is conducted by George F. Conner and is held each night, Monday through Friday from 7 to 10. The course has proved particularly helpful in preparing men to take the navy's Eddy test for radio technician training, according to report. Navy Recruiter Dan Schreiber said this week that he hoped that every man who can possibly do so, will take the radio course as offered by Conner. "Most men," Schreiber said, "who have taken the Eddy test have found the radio section most difficult and requiring the greatest technical knowledge. Conner has a

thorough understanding of the requirements of the Eddy test and any man who feels that he needs additional knowledge in radio would do well to take this course."

LABOR CONTRACTS BACKED BY KAISER

PORTLAND, May 27 (AP)—Post-war labor contracts which provide labor a share of industrial profits were backed today by Edgar F. Kaiser, general manager of the Kaiser shipyards in this area.

The shipbuilder's son told the University of Portland's institute of individual relations last night that labor and management should begin immediately to pattern post-war contracts which give workers part of the returns. "If there is to be transition to

a better industrial order," he said, "labor and management must sit down now and figure out a contract that will be better for both of them. We've found in our operations that you can pay high wages and still do a job cheaper."
Kaiser rejected "cumbersome legislation" as a control for labor problems. "Labor relations are human relations," he said. "The only approach is the human approach. Labor and management accept Christianity although in the past they have not always practiced it."
