D., for training as a radio operator-mechanic. Upon completion of a 20-week course, he will be fully trained to take his place as a member of a highly skilled bomber crew of the army air forces. Pvt. Lewis graduated from Merrill high school in 1943. He was inducted into the armed forces on November 10 of last year. Previous to being sent to his new station at Sioux Falls, Lloyd was stationed at Buckley Field, Colo., and Pullman, Wash.

KEESLER FIELD, Biloxi, Miss., June 1—Pvt. Charles L. Snapp, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. Snapp, box 997, Merrill, Ore., was graduated today from the B-24 Liberator bomber mechanic's school here and is now ready for active line duty.

Pvt. Snapp, however, may be sent to a factory school for further specialized training or to one of the army air forces training command's flexible gunnery schools to become an aerial gunner.
