SPECIAL EVENTS PLANNED AT RODEO

This year, several special events are to be featured in addition to the Klamath Buckaroo Days queen's riding contest at the fairgrounds on Sunday, June 18, at 2 p. m. According to J. C. Hunt, vice president of the Buckaroo Days' celebration, the following horse show has been planned:

The first event is to be a 5-gaited saddle horse contest, the horse to be ridden by either man or woman. This event is open to all 5-gaited horses—stallions, mares or geldings.

Second will be the colored pleasure saddle horse event, open to all palominos, pintos or white horses and ridden by either man or woman.

The third event will feature a stock horse contest shown under saddle and open to any colored stock horse ridden by man or woman.

Following this event will be the queen's riding contest. Final event is to be a stallion parade, open to any breed or colored stallion, the horses to be shown either under saddle or led by halter.

Hunt said that in addition to the events above, the association will be more than willing to add a match race or two if there are any entries.

Dairy Production Payment Period Named by CCC

The period May 1 to June 30, 1944, inclusive, has been designated as one dairy production payment period, by the commodity credit corporation, according to County Agent C. A. Henderson.

Producers' applications for this payment period may be filed until August 31, 1944. The rate per cwt. for milk shall be 45 cents, and for butterfat deliveries 6 cents. These rates are to continue through August, after which the payment will be 70 cents per cwt. for milk, and 10 cents for butterfat, through March, 1945.

LAKE CANNERY TO BE SET UP AGAIN

LAKEVIEW—The Lakeview community cannery which proved to be so successful last year, will be in operation again this year, the Lakeview unit being one of the 14 school community canneries operating in the state in 1944.
