One of the most active units in the county, working on the surgical dressings project for the American Red Cross, is the Altamont unit which meets each Wednesday from 9 o'clock in the morning until 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Workrooms are in the junior high school building.

This is one surgical dressings unit which is proud of its production record. The quota is 900 bandages weekly and during the month of May total production was chucked up to 7633 dressings. The workers put in 573 hours during May and instructors worked 143 1/2 hours.
