**Eisenhowers Hear Broadcasts**  
TACOMA, June 6 (AP) The Edgar N. Eisenhower family here was sleepy today after spending the night listening to the radio and receiving telephone calls from friends. Eisenhower, Tacoma attorney and brother of the commander of the allied liberation forces, told interviewers "I'll bet the people who are really cheering this morning are the French."  
He said "The only question is: How costly those landings will be. And I hope to God, it's not too much. I have no doubt what's going to happen. Those forces are going right across the country and the paratroopers all forgiven. Good luck. Car-General Eisenhower's personal announcement of the long-anticipated invasion was the first time Attorney Eisenhower had heard his brother's voice since the general spoke in recent war bond broadcasts.
