Cinci Reds May Blast Card Dream

Leave it to Bucky Walters and the Cincinnati Reds who will ruin the St. Louis Cardinals' dreams of a third straight National league pennant.

Leave it to the home run, and the New York Yankees will wind up in the American league's also-ran column.

These are two strange developments produced in the major leagues by a third wartime season.

Up to 1944 Walters had beaten St. Louis only 18 times in 42 starts, but now he has handed them three straight setbacks by scores of 1-0, 2-0 and 2-1. Not until the ninth frame of last night's 2-1 tilt in Cincinnati were the Cards able to break a string of 30 scoreless innings against Bucky's effective tossing. Walters thus became the first big league hurler to notch a ninth victory.

Two top-ranking National league hurlers clashed as Walters tangled with Max Lanier, and Billy Southworth followed with a second ace, George Munger, in relief but the Cincy No. 1 man took the nod on two unearned runs.

Since 1935 the Yankees have been home run kings of the Har-die loop, but the blow that built the big stadium in the Bronx has been backfiring against the world champs. In 42 games only 20 Yanks have homered, against 27 by the opposition, the latest being Roy Partee's first round tripper of the season in the last of the ninth yesterday to give Boston and 8-7 twilight edge. The Red Sox pounded Joe Page for five runs in the first, but the New Yorkers rallied before dropping their ninth in 11 starts.

Washington pulled out of the cellar on George Myatt's triple scoring Johnny Sullivan and Milo Candini in the 11th for a 7-5 margin over Philadelphia after the A's had tied with three in the ninth.

Connie Mack's men tumbled all the way into the basement when Cleveland bunched three hits in the fifth to down the St. Louis Browns, 4-3, in a night game. Doubles by Mike Rocco and Roy Cullenbine, who is setting the American league on fire with his slugging feats, provided the winning margin over Jack Kramer who allowed six hits. The Detroit-Chicago game was postponed because of rain.

Shortstop Eddie Stanky, recently acquired from the Cubs, bowed in as Brooklyn shortstop to steady the Dodgers infield in a double triumph over the Phils, 6-3 and 8-1. Les Webber, who relieved Hal Gregg in the opener, and Eddie Head, who went all the way in the nightcap, were the winners.

Bill Voiselle grabbed his sixth victory in 13 starts as the New York Giants shaded Boston, 8-4, and Chicago rioted with eight runs in the second but had to keep pressing to trim Pittsburgh, 10-6.

Baker—Angling fair, with good catches of silversides from Higgins reservoir.

Tillamook—Flies and single eggs have attracted bag limits; conditions generally good.

Coos—Good in south half, with some good catches of trout from upper streams; catfishing good in Coquille river; north half good with water high and clear. Lakes and streams yielding bass, catfish and trout.

Multnomah—Conditions good in streams and lakes.

Columbia—Improved weather put streams in fine shape throughout the county.

Washington—All streams good for fly fishing; good catches from upper Nehalem river and upper Tualatin and Dairy creek.

Lake—Dairy, Deep, Bud, Camas, Honey Silver and Crooked creeks fair for fly fishing; Dog lake fair for trolling; Anna, Chewaucan and the South Fork of the Sprague rivers yielding rainbow trout.

Harney—Few bag limits taken, due to high water.

Byrd Nabs Birdies in Summer Tour

PHILADELPHIA, June 9 (AP)—He may be a bit too old for baseball, but he's young enough to give a top-flight war-time tournament field a golf lesson.

Sam Byrd, who back in 1937 quit roaming the outfield for the New York Yankees.

The Redford, Mich., pro is the one they're trying to catch today as some 120 professionals, service men and amateurs tee off in the second 18-hole round of the \$17,500 Inquirer war bond invitational tourney—first stop on the summer tour—at the rugged par 71 layout of the Torresdale-Frankford Country club.

Once known as a fly-catcher de luxe, Byrd was a catching birdie yesterday as he clipped par by five strokes with a 66 which was good enough for a two-stroke edge at the quarter mark in the 72-hole medal play test.

Two strokes back was Bob Hamilton of Evansville, Ind., winner of the North-South open at Pinehurst, the ex-caddy having a 32-36-68. Next, with 69, was Bud Lewis of Oreland, Pa., the open and PGA king of this area.

Bracketed at 70 were National Open Champion Craig Wood of Mammoth, N. Y., and Harold (Jug) McSpaden of Philadelphia, who won most of the winter tour cash and bonds.

Byron Nelson of Toledo, O., former national open and PGA ruler, pre-tourney co-favorite with McSpaden, came up with a par 71 although he said he "didn't play well."

Katonen Mat Title Held Up at Salem

Paavo Katonen can't put up his belt for the armory match tonight, for the Salem boxing commission is holding it up following the disputed Sneeze Achiu battle last Tuesday night. However, he will headline the fight card with George Wagner as scheduled.

It seems that Paavo lost the Salem match to Sneeze by two out of three falls, but due to a terrific melee at the end of the battle, the question of who should walk off with the belt was left undecided. Now the chairman of the Salem commission is holding the belt awaiting word from the National Wrestling association as to who is the proper title.

Another last minute change in tonight's card is in the semi-windup. Originally Bulldog Jackson, otherwise known as the colorful Yukon Jake, was scheduled to take on Tarzan Potvin, Canadian mauler. Bulldog couldn't make connections; so Pete Belcastro, who has recovered from the terrific mauling he received at the hands of Wagner three weeks ago, will take his place.

Belcastro wanted to have his first return match with Wagner—to vindicate himself for the slugging he received—but took this one just to get into line for another chance at Wagner later.

The opening battle will feature Silent Rattan in a scientific mat battle with Buck Lipscomb. Both boys are crowd pleasers who have wrestled here previously.

According to reports from authoritative sources, few persons have returned tickets as evidence of their disappointment in Paavo's inability to put up his belt as stake in tonight's match. Most expect the Wagner-Katonen struggle to be a knock-down drag-out affair which will give them their money's worth despite the lack of title for incentive.
