## OPA Balks Over Replacing Stolen Gasoline Coupons

PORTLAND, June 9 (AP) — Gasoline coupons robbed from service stations will no longer be replaced without investigation by the office of price administration (OPA) enforcement division, the district OPA said today.

Sol Storn, district OPA enforcement attorney, blamed carelessness of service station operators for their losses totaling 50,878 gallons of gasoline within the last six months.

"Operators have been warned repeatedly to exercise the same care in handling gasoline coupons as they do in handling money," he said.

In a few cases, he reported, robbers have been faked by operators dealing in the black

market to account for their lack of coupons.

## Sodium Deposits Seen In Lake Beds Of Lake County

PORTLAND, June 9 (AP) — Lake county's ancient lake beds may yield sodium deposits which could be used in new chemical industries, F. W. Libbey said today.

Libbey, acting head of the state department of geology and minerals, returned from the Lake county area to begin a month's extensive tests of sodium carbonate, sodium potash and other sodium salts found there.
