German Attacks
Germans made four fighter-bomber attacks against the invasion beaches between early yesterday morning and late last night, employing some 60 planes, but were driven off each time.

The first three attacks were handled by RAF Spitfires, which shot down three German planes and damaged more without loss. The last attack cost the Germans seven planes, again with no loss to the allies.

Yards Hit
Several hundred RAF heavy bombers, flying through rain and thick clouds, hit the switching yards and rail junctions at Rennes, Fougères, Alençon, Mayenne and Pontaubault last night. These lie south and west of the Normandy fighting front. Two of the heavy bombers are missing from these operations.

An air ministry announcement said poor flying weather appeared also to be hampering the Germans, since the big British Lancasters and Halifaxes met fewer Nazi fighters than on the previous night.

These British airmen had glimpses of the ground fighting and saw bright flashes from the sea west of the Cherbourg peninsula, where allied warships appeared to be bombarding the coast. They said the attack on the Fougères yards left a column of smoke towering 2000 feet.

Allied light bombers also struck at rail targets behind the battle area during the night.

Bucking the bad weather, English, Australian and New Zealand Mosquito squadrons shot up trains and bombed railroad stations, roads, bridges and German encampments.

SPITE of bad weather, we seem to be gaining so far. Our supreme command announces today that "progress is satisfactory."

WE'RE beginning to get a few details of the fighting. You must have noted from the pictures that many of the landings were made on narrow beaches with an OVERHANGING bank. As our men climbed this bank they were met by a blast of enemy fire. They then had to take shelter UNDER the bank while other units got around BEHIND and wiped out the German gunners.

Eventually our engineers built roads up these banks and our forces poured through.

SCANTY and unofficial reports indicate that we may have from 200,000 to 300,000 men ashore by this time. Compare this with the TOTAL of our forces available in England. You'll see at once that we have VAST reserves available.

We need a port to get these reserves more quickly into action.

ALSO we have plenty of forces with which to strike SOMEWHERE ELSE if the Germans throw TOO MANY of their reserves into the Cherbourg peninsula fighting.

THE Germans say today the Russians have advanced "several miles" in Romania. The Russians say only that they have taken an "important height."

Correspondent Gilmore, cabling from Moscow, says: "Things seen on this correspondent's three recent trips to the Russian front tend to back the predictions of a new red offensive. Preparations are being made for an attack which should shake Hitler from Russian soil and drive the nazis BACK TO BERLIN."

IN Italy, the Germans are still in full retreat north of Rome. They've begun today to pull back their forces from the Adriatic side. They're heading for a new defense line farther north.

DISPATCHES from Burma today to be slipping from Japan's grip. The Salween Chinese are still moving nearer a junction with us at Myitkyina. A Jap CRUISER has been damaged by our planes off New Guinea. That's the first Jap warship reported out in a long time.

Inside China, the Japs are still gaining. They are reported only 7 1/2 miles from Changsha today.

Slower Progress
The eighth army conformed with this drive by a continued thrust northward along the east side of the Tiber, but progress there was slower due to demolitions and mines.

Just east of the Tiber, 20 enemy anti-tank and self-propelled guns were knocked out in the vicinity of Monterotondo, whose capture was announced yesterday. Lt. Gen. Sir Oliver Leese's forces have gone several miles beyond Monterotondo.

Striking bakery drivers in Toledo called off a work stoppage which began May 28 in protest against what union leaders termed a delay of the regional WLB in processing their case, involving wages and overtime pay.

Other labor troubles continued to slow production at a half dozen industries, affecting about 4200 employees. These included 1600 AFL bottling department workers at seven New Jersey breweries; 1000 employees at the DuPont Rayon company's plant at Old Hickory, Tenn.; 750 AFL construction workers at two refinery projects in Wilmington, Calif.; 480 bakers in Toledo, O.; 350 workers at the Victor Chemical plant in Mt. Pleasant, Tenn.; and 52 men at the navy-operated special ordnance plant in York, Pa.

PARATROOPS SEIZE STE. MERE EGLISE

Ste. Mere Eglise and astride the main communications linking Cherbourg with the rest of France.

With the "doughboy general," Lt. Gen. Omar N. Bradley ashore and personally leading his American forces, headquarters disclosed that the allied beachhead strength included the Canadian third division. This was the fourth allied division officially disclosed as on the beachhead. The others are the sixth British airborne, the first American and the 50th (Northumbrian) British division.

Troop Commander
Brig. Gen. Paul L. Williams of Detroit, was disclosed as the commander of the ninth air force troop carrier command which helped plan and direct the D-Day airborne operations to the beachhead, which German reports pictured as more than 10 miles deep at places.

While guns roared along the front, allied warships roamed up and down the coast as roving artillery spotting German pockets and strongpoints.

Bad Weather
Deteriorating weather again fell upon the channel, but headquarters said the wind was in a more favorable direction for unloading streams of supplies and reinforcements.

Field dispatches disclosed that the British and Canadian landings on D-Day were in the region of Berniers-sur-Mer, at the mouth of the Orne river and north of Caen. Berniers is in allied hands.

The German communiqué conceded the loss of Ste. Mere Eglise, astride one of the main German arteries leading to Cherbourg, saying the Americans were pushing "north and south" from the landing head there.

Near Valognes
Then a later Berlin broadcast said U. S. troops had advanced a mile beyond the town toward Valognes, 12 miles southeast on the port that would form a great funnel for allied reinforcements and supplies into the battle for France.

American Rear Admiral John Leslie Hall Jr., on a tour of the beachhead, told correspondents operations were going well, but stressed the necessity of quickly building up our forces. At least 1600 Nazi prisoners have been taken. A field dispatch said today Americans had captured 600, including some Russians and Poles.

Other Berlin broadcasts reported street fighting in Caen, and an allied push toward Car-

entan, 40 miles to the west, and 29 from Cherbourg.

No Confirmation
Supreme headquarters gave no confirmation of these or other details, but declared the steadily-augmented allies were holding firm under counter-blasts of increasing weight and "making progress" on all sectors.

Front dispatches said the battle was developing into a race for supplies, and "it looks as if the allies are winning." There was a freshening breeze today over the misty English channel after a hampering overnight rain.

Horses Used
The Germans rolled up more tanks, dropped paratroop troops and sent some supplies charging to the front behind horses.

The Germans made no mention of paratroops earlier reported landed on the west coast 20 miles from Ste. Mere Eglise in an effort to pinch off the tip of the peninsula and its port of 36,000 inhabitants.

Ten German divisions now are engaged, supreme headquarters said, while the Germans said up to 20 allied divisions had been thrown in. Many Nazi prisoners have been taken. The allied command was silent on the battle for Caen—a town of 61,000 population. Caen was described as a pivot of German defenses.

Stab 5 Miles
The Germans said the allies had penetrated five miles below and six miles west of fallen Bayeux, and said allied beachheads had been strengthened. The Nazi high command claimed gains east of the Orne.

One front dispatch said Americans now hold a beachhead five miles deep on a broad scale, with smaller penetrations several miles farther inland. U. S. paratroop troops captured one town. It said, and infantrymen drove the nazis from another. Much of the fighting was waged on a tree-to-tree and ditch-to-ditch basis, it added.

Other front reports said "it is becoming the most involved battle" with local retreats and advances having a very definite effect on the general plans both of our commanders and the enemy. Both are seizing every

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chance to drive in a wedge when there is the slightest faltering.

Bombers Active

RAF night bombers hammered German supply rails behind the Normandy peninsula.

"Landings have continued on all beaches and by-passed strong points of enemy resistance are being steadily reduced," said invasion communiqué No. 7.

The weather, unstable since before the first landings at dawn Tuesday, took another unfavorable dip late yesterday. Rain fell steadily throughout the night from low-lying clouds, bringing a reduction in air operations. For the first time since the dawn of D-Day there was no official mention of airborne operations last night.

Many Divisions
An official announcement here said 10 German divisions now were in action in Normandy. Axis broadcasts have asserted between 15 and 20 American, British and Canadian divisions have been landed.

By German account, tank battles raged all the way from Caen on the east to the Cherbourg peninsula on the west.

Transocean said in a Berlin broadcast that allied liberating forces had made their deepest penetration in the area of captured Bayeux, inland from the center of the Normandy invasion coast. It declared "grim" fighting between German and British tanks was in progress four or five miles southwest of Bayeux.
