Commission Heeds Pleas Of Hunters

Klamath, Lake Counties Affected by New Rule; Game Men's Stand Praised

It will be illegal to kill doe deer in Klamath and Lake counties this year.

The state game commission, meeting at Portland Saturday, heeded the pleas of sportsmen in voting against issuance of doe tags in these two counties for the 1944 season.

Strong representation in opposition to another doe season was made to the commission, and its cooperative attitude was warmly praised by Klamath sportsmen Monday.

John Ebinger, president of the Klamath-Molok chapter of the Izaak Walton League, W. J. Kessler, president of the Klamath Sportsmen's association, and N. B. Drew, Izaak-Walton director, attended the meeting.

Numerous resolutions and letters had been presented to the commission on the subject, which has been widely discussed among sportsmen and conservation groups in this area.

In a doe season in the Klamath-Lake area last year, hunters reported bagging 3689 doe deer.

Game commissioners indicated at the meeting that they wanted to make a more thorough study of the effects of that season, and will proceed with caution concerning future seasons on doe.

Ducks Lose Two Games Of Double

Pennant Chase Tightens As League-Lead Beavers Retain Hold on Top Spot

By The Associated Press The Portland Beavers lost both games of a Pacific Coast league doubleheader Sunday to the Los Angeles Angels but retained top standing at the end of a week which tightened the pennant chase as lower-half club wallowed the other leaders.

The San Francisco Seals, who started the week's play in a tie with Portland for the lead, dropped back to third place while losing three weekend games to the tail-end Sacramento Solons. The Seals made five errors in the opener and four more miscues in the nightcap as Sacramento was winning the Sunday games, 9 to 4 and 11 to 1. The Solons took the Saturday contest, 3 to 2, in 14 innings. Sacramento took the series, 5 games to 2.

Seattle split with Oakland, 4 to 2 and 1 to 2, Sunday and moved into second place although the Acorns won the series, 4 games to 3. Oakland won Saturday, 3 to 2.

San Diego remained one percentage point behind the fourth-place Hollywood Stars by splitting Sunday's doubleheader. The Padres won the opener, 7 to 1, but lost the final game, 4 to 7. San Diego won a 10-inning affair Saturday, 4 to 1. The Padres took the series, 5 games to 2.

Los Angeles had little trouble with the Portland club Sunday, taking games, 3 to 1 and 9 to 1. The Beavers were the only team in the top half of the circuit to win more games than they lost during the past week. They registered 3 victories to 2 for the Angels, but the clubs still must play off a 7-7 tie, stopped in the fourteenth inning Friday night by the league time limit rule.

In the series opening Tuesday, Los Angeles will move to Seattle and Oakland will visit Portland while the slipping Seals will entertain San Diego and Sacramento will go to Hollywood.

Game Commission Sets Hunting Dates For Season

PORTLAND, June 12 (AP)—Tentative dates for 1944 hunting seasons were announced by the State game commission today. Subject to revision at a meeting set for June 24, they are:

Buck deer—October 1 to 31. Bull elk—November 4 to 30, except in Clatsop, Coos and Douglas counties where the dates are November 4 to 14, and in southeastern Oregon where shooting will be permitted from November 4 to 14.

Thus the headline bout looks like a wild affair. Promoter Mack Lillard has signed Buck Davidson—who will open last week with Silent Rattan to battle Walter "Sneeze" Achiu. Sneeze dropped Katonen in a disputed title match at Salem last Tuesday and may do the same to Buck.

Fans, who have seen the China boy fight, say he is an expert on pressure points and scientific wrestling. Scheduled for the opener this Friday are Silent Rattan and Herb Parks. If the Silent lad puts on as good a fight as he did last week, the record match should hold every bit as much crowd appeal as the big event of the evening.

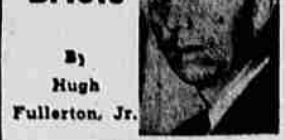

Yanks Slipping, But Not Out Of American League Flag Chase

They may be slipping, but don't count the world champion New York Yankees out of the running in the American league baseball race—not yet, anyway.

The Yankees lost a doubleheader to the Boston Red Sox yesterday, 2 to 1 and 4 to 1, extending their string of defeats to 11 of their last 13 starts. This is a record more characteristic of a tailend club than a pennant contender, but one need only recall last July when the Yankees were in the throes of a somewhat similar slump.

Then the Yankees were reeling on the ropes, barely hanging onto first place by a few percentage points. Just when things looked blackest they won eight in a row and followed through by winning the flag and the world series.

Tex Hughson and Clem Hausmann pitched the Red Sox to their double triumph. Hughson's effort was a three-hit masterpiece. In addition, he drove in the winning run in the opener by getting an infield hit with the bases loaded.

Meantime the St. Louis Cardinals, National league champs, gained two games over their nearest competitors by whipping Cincinnati twice, 3 to 1 and 4 to 1, while the Chicago Cubs shut out Pittsburgh twice, 5 to 0 and 1 to 0.

The Cardinals set a league record for doubleheaders in a doubleheader by making nine twin killings, four in the opener and five in the nightcap, in backing up six-hit twirling by both George Mun-

ger and Harry Gumbert. Walker Cooper, Whitey Kurowski and Danny Litwhiler hit consecutive homers for the Cards in the nightcap.

Paul Erickson turned in a two-bitter and Bob Chipman a five-bitter for the Cubs as they blanked the Pirates. Umpire George Magerkurth banished both Manager Frankie Frisch and Outfielder Johnny Barrett, of the Pirates, after an argument in the opener.

The Chicago White Sox beat Dizzy Trout, 4 to 2, for their eighth straight triumph in the first game of a twin bill with Detroit, but had their streak snapped in the afterpiece when Stubby Overmire won, 1-0, on Rudy York's ninth inning single. Detroit thus climbed into third place as the Sox went into a fourth place tie with the Yankees.

A grand slam seventh inning home run by Pinch Hitter Gene Moore gave the first place St. Louis Browns a split with Cleveland. The Indians easily took the opener, 13 to 1 behind Mel Harper, but Moore's round-tripper in the nightcap gave Bob Murciief and the Browns a 4 to 2 triumph. Umpire Charley Berry banished Manager Luke Sewell, of the Browns, in the second game.

The New York Giants swept a doubleheader from the Phillies, both by scores of 6 to 5 with the second game going 12 innings, before Phil Weintraub singled Mel Ott home with the winning tally. Nap Reyes' ninth inning single won the opener.
