News Behind the News

By PAUL MALLON WASHINGTON, June 11—A latent but tremendous popular interest out in the country over the confused status of the Atlantic charter as it faces leftist ideologies in war-torn Europe has been freshly detected by the senate.

An astonishing number of requests have come in for copies of a speech by New Hampshire's Republican Senator Bridges, made in the senate May 23. Recently, the number was above 80,000, and it will run above 100,000.

About 40,000 of the first requests came from protestant groups, 10,000 more from Catholics, the rest from other sources.

The public may recall the address as a criticism of Mr. Roosevelt giving naval vessels to Russia when Churchill would not let the Italian navy go, and inasmuch as we still face a great naval war in the Pacific in which Russia is not involved.

This was only the introduction of the Bridges' speech which reached the headlines. The bulk of it was a less sensational inquiry into the status of the Atlantic charter and four freedoms directed to Mr. Roosevelt and asking him: "Have you lost the initiative in Europe?"

Italian News Confuses THE news from Italy lately has only added to the popular confusion. The withdrawal of the king in favor of Crown Prince Umberto as "Lieutenant General of the Realm" has received varied interpretations.

The pronouncements of the Vatican immediately after the freeing of Rome revealed no inkling of its political knowledge or intentions.

The Communist Leader Browder has broadcast on our radio domestically an implication that some Catholic churchmen have accepted the validity of Russian indications of espousal of religion as against the atheism and agnostic ideologies formerly promoted and imposed on the Russians by the state.

The only thing clear, therefore, is that there is confusion—therefore no agreement. Valid and authentic interpretations beyond this may be a long time coming.

It was supposed to be a laboratory for working out the conflicts, but the political re-organization there so far has been too difficult for words, at least any official words from Messrs. Roosevelt, Churchill, or Stalin.

The communists are in control of almost all the European underground movements, and are, therefore, the most active political influence we are freeing not only in Italy, France, and Poland, but throughout Europe.

The Meaning of Freedom

ALWAYS in the past, they have used the words "freedom" and "democracy" in a far different sense than we do, so documentary evidence thus far has done little to change the confusion.

Also, Russia in the past has changed its ideological course temporarily with its fingers crossed behind its back, solely to get its way, and when this purpose was accomplished, it would revert to its original purpose.

Suspensions, therefore, are natural and will not easily be dispelled. If the transferring of an unexplained title of "lieutenant general" from the king to Umberto (later to be passed, some say, to Umberto's son) becomes a cover for an Italian communist radical grasp for power, it is one thing. If it becomes only a cover for the confusion (as it most likely is) then the fruits of war are being ripened only on the outside peeling, and worms at the core will continue to work.

One Christian Force

YET in Italy, there is one force which is certainly Christian in its ideals—the ideals which Mr. Roosevelt rightly described May 27, 1941 (quoted in the Bridges speech) as being the dignity of the human being, of the majesty of the human soul, in a world where moral standards are measured by treachery and bribery and fifth columnists.

The Vatican is not only "the best informed institution on earth," but well might be a great influence in Italy, Poland, France, etc., where there seem to be few Roosevelt democrats, and as far as I can see it, the main power present to be used for maintenance of the Christian ideology along with the Church of England and various protestant denominations on the continent.

This being the second most important subject in the world, second only to the necessities for our success in France—and due to the fact that I raised it at the outset when it was unpopular, and have pursued it without neglect in the face of criticism—I will have more on it tomorrow.

LOAN DRIVE TO BEGIN IN TEXARKANA

TEXARKANA, Tex., June 12 (AP)—Bedecked with flags of the United Nations, Texarkana and 20,000 visitors were off to a running start today in the \$18,000,000 Fifth War Loan drive which Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau Jr., will launch nationally tonight.

The bond campaign officially opens at 7 p. m. PWT, with a four-network broadcast originating here on which President Roosevelt will speak. Secretary Morgenthau will be the master of ceremonies.

Texas exceeded its goal of \$4,465,000 for the Fifth War Loan drive in a gun-jumping campaign two days ago. However, Secretary Morgenthau will appear this afternoon at a bond rally after inspecting the Red river ordnance depot and the Lone Star ordnance plant.

Treasury officials said the broadcast opening the national war bond campaign would contrast Nazi and democratic philosophies and that Morgenthau would inform the nation what it will face in financing the remainder of the war.

Gov. Coke Stevenson of Texas, Gov. Homer Adkins of Arkansas and Gov. Jimmie Davis of Louisiana were among the visitors awaiting the celebration. Actor-Producer Orson Welles, who is assisting Morgenthau with the big radio show, led the parade of Hollywood notables present.

COURT SPLITS ON HARTZEL CASE DECISION

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—In two decisions, the supreme court today set aside the conviction of a Chicago statistician on espionage charges and revoked cancellation of citizenship of a German-born citizen accused of falsely pledging allegiance to the United States.

At the conclusion of today's meeting, the court adjourned for the summer.

The espionage case, raising a question under the 1917 espionage act for the first time in the current war, involved Elmer Hartzel, a native of Pennsylvania. He was charged with circulating pamphlets aimed at attempting to produce insubordination, disloyalty, mutiny or refusal to serve in the armed forces.

The court split 5-4 on Hartzel. Justice Murphy, who wrote the majority opinion, said that while the ideas expressed by Hartzel were "odious," there was not sufficient evidence to show that he intended by the pamphlets to bring about insubordination or other disturbances in the military services.

"No direct or affirmative appeals are made to that effect and no mention is made of military personnel or of persons registered under the selective training and service act," Murphy said.

Justice Reed, with Justice Frankfurter, Douglas and Jackson concurring, dissented, contending there was ample evidence to warrant a conviction.

Neighbor Policy Depends on U. S.

PORTLAND, June 12 (AP)—The future of the good neighbor policy in South America depends on the United States, according to a statement by the director of the Institute of International Law at Reed college last night.

"Our long, nagging neighbor policy in South America has been taken away from us by the intervention in South America," asserted Wallace.

Another speaker, Dr. Dip Lum, Chinese consul in British Hongkong, said that the settlement of the war must be returned to China.

Marine Strength Up to 400,000

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—The marine corps' strength totaled 452,727, including commissioned and enlisted personnel, both men and women, on April 30, the marines announced today.

The greatest number were from New York state, 46,893. Pennsylvania was second with 40,391; California third with 27,828; Illinois fourth with 27,538, and Ohio fifth with 26,357.

The list of other states includes: Washington 6133; Oregon, 4470; Montana, 2184; Idaho, 1895; Utah, 2298.

Army Pilot Killed In Canadian Crash

EDMONTON, Alta., June 12 (CP)—A United States army air force transport command ferry pilot was killed Saturday near Grande Prairie, 310 miles northwest of Edmonton, in a mid-air collision in a northbound formation, U. S. army officials announced today.

The other plane was slightly damaged. Next of kin have been informed and the pilot's name will be released shortly.
