Betz, Hart Favored For Feminine Finals; Segura, Talbert Rated Top Men

By WATSON SPOELSTRA DETROIT, June 13 (AP)—The seeded list was intact in the national clay court championships today except for one player who didn't show up for a first round match at the Detroit Tennis club, and everything pointed to the pairings in Sunday's finals of Pauline Betz of Los Angeles against Doris Hart of Miami, Fla., and Francisco Segura, of Coral Gables, Fla., against Billy Talbert of Indianapolis.

Miss Betz, holder of two national lawn titles, in addition to the clay crown she won here last year, gets into action against Ruth Miho of Los Angeles today. Miss Betz was idle yesterday as Miss Hart smashed out a 6-1, 6-2 triumph over blond Joanne Dunn of Des Moines, Ia.

Sox Slugging Fielder Ups Bat Average

NEW YORK, June 13 (AP)—Thurman Tucker, slugging center fielder for the Chicago White Sox, fattened his batting average 15 points during the past week and now is in a position to make a strong bid for the crown of best batter in the major leagues which is being worn by Dixie Walker of the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Tucker's spurt lifted him to .398. In the same period, Walker's aggregate skidded 10 points to .416. Walker's decline also has brought him opposition from within the National league. Stan Musial, St. Louis speedster and the circuit's leading swatsmith a year ago, zoomed from .348 a week ago to .369. Today's tabulation includes games of yesterday.

Phil Weintraub, New York Giant first baseman, was ninth a week ago with .316 but his slugging of the past seven days has lifted his season's total to .343 and third place.

When Jake Powell singled in the 11th inning to give Washington a 4 to 3 victory it marked the Yankees' sixth straight defeat and their 12th setback in their last 14 games.

The regulation game had ended in a 1-1 deadlock and it appeared that the Yanks were in when they scored twice in the tenth. But the Senators tied it up again in their half and proceeded to tag Alley Donald for the winning run in the 11th. Donald had relieved starter Joe Page who pitched the first nine innings. Johnny Niggeling went the distance for the Senators.

Huskies May Make 2-Game Southern Swing; Colleges To Get Copies of Code

HOOD RIVER, Ore., June 13 (AP)—A slightly meatier far western football slate for 1944 appeared in the making at the summer Pacific coast conference meeting here today.

Washington's Huskies may take a two-game southland swing against the California Bears and Southern California — with UCLA an outside possibility — as major fall football dates, it was reported unofficially.

Under the proposal, the husky navy trainee squad would take advantage of the October 21-30 vacation period to play games in the Los Angeles coliseum and against the Bears at Berkeley on successive weekends. The navy's 48-hour limit on travel would not apply during this interval.
