90 SEGREGES COMPLETE WRA GROUP MOVES

TULELAKE—With the arrival of 90 new Japanese residents at the WRA segregation center at Newell recently, the scheduled movement of groups from other centers as a part of the segregation program has been completed, according to WRA officials. The last contingent came from the Gila relocation center in Arizona.

Housing accommodations in the center are now filled to capacity with overflow being housed in 20 recreation halls that have been partitioned to take care of family groups.

There are still in other centers a large number of segregees eligible for transfer to Tulelake because of leave clearances, denials, repatriation or expatriation applications, but housing lack prevents the removal to this center.

There are no plans for the building of additional blocks in the center, according to officials.
