(Continued From Page One) Iian isthmus, benefitting Finnish troops who now are in process of "stabilizing the front." The Russians already were moving down both roads toward Vilpuri. Beyond Raivola they made good progress down the main highway toward Vilpuri. Great sectors of the front running along the Gulf of Finland from Terijoki to Vilpuri was under heavy fire from soviet guns, an Izvestia dispatch said.

The Russians were blasting their way through deep lines of fortifications, one of the most striking of which was a series of German self-propelled "Ferdinand" guns dug into the earth. (Increased Russian activity was reported along the Litsa river in the Petsamo sector in the far north of Finland, the Stockholm Aftonbladet reported from Helsinki. This river which empties into the Arctic sea is about 15 miles east of the 1940 Finnish border. German troops have been stalled there since 1941.)

**Pioneer Klamath Resident Passes Away At Home Here**

(Continued From Page One) of the first graduating class at the high school at Oakland. She married Henry E. Momyer in the Bay area. They moved to Red Bluff and, in 1895, with two teams of horses pulling their wagons, came into the Klamath area. Mr. Momyer became the first postmaster at Merrill, and operated the first store and livery stable there. He was later appointed postmaster at Klamath Agency, and built and operated the store later acquired from him by Orville Elliott, the present owner.

Selling out in 1903, the Momyers returned briefly to San Francisco, and were there at the time of the earthquake and fire. Mr. Momyer was appointed a Crater lake park ranger, and they returned to Klamath. Mrs. Momyer used to accompany her husband to the lake in the early spring, going as far as possible by team and then on snowshoes into the lake. Mr. Momyer passed away on April 6, 1928.

Funeral arrangements are in charge of the Earl Whitlock Funeral home. Mrs. Momyer is survived by her daughter, Mrs. Odell, a son, Harry E. Momyer of Philadelphia, a grandchild and a great-grandchild. Mrs. Momyer was a beloved pioneer, who was active in many of the affairs of the community. She was a past matron of Aloha chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, and was a member of Eulalona chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution; Prosperity Lodge, Rebekahs, and the Methodist church. Rev. Victor Phillips of the church will conduct the services, time for which will be announced by Whitlock's.

**NEW NAZI DEFENSES SMASHED BY TROOPS**

(Continued From Page One) Rome and pushed on, nearing Latera, four miles further north. Northwest of the lake, South African forces moving toward Orvieto ran into a stiff battle in Bagno Regio. Capture Prisoners On the Tyrrhenian coast American doughboys encountered a new series of dug-in defenses east of Orbetello and attacked through high ground directly toward lateral highway 74, which is about 90 road miles from Rome at that point. In a sharp and bloody engagement they captured 142 prisoners from the German 162nd Turcoman division and killed 100 more of the enemy.

The advance was considerably more rapid on the Adriatic sector, where eighth army troops crossed the Saline river, some five miles north of captured Pescara, at several places. Capture Popoli These allied forces took Popoli, on the Rome-Pescara road 10 miles north of Sulmona, where the advance had halted only long enough to take 20 prisoners. South of Terni, in the center of the advance line, the enemy continued to put up a fight but some progress was made there, also.

The eighth army forces in the Tiber valley advanced to the southwest of Corchil, reaching high ground across highway No. 5 and taking a number of villages. Mines Swept It was announced by the allied naval command that a port party was established at Civitavecchia June 9 to begin restoring the facilities which had been heavily battered by allied bombing and air enemy demolitions. Many mines have been swept up from the coast from Anzio northward. Last night RAF bombers swept over Hungary and attacked the Almas-Fuzito oil refineries near Komarom, northwest of Budapest, starting large fires.

**Klamath Man May Be In On Invasion**

At least one Klamath Falls man is in all probability taking an active part in the European invasion. It was learned from his mother today, that Alfred LaBarge, 19, has been stationed on the battlefield Nevada for the past year and a half. The Nevada has been mentioned in Associated Press reports as participating in the invasion.

(Continued From Page One) asserted "the German build-up" of counter forces is beginning. The fourth division took Montebourg after bitter street fighting.

**DRIVE INLAND**

One of these driving inland 11 miles near Ste. Mere Ellise captured Pont L'Abe, only five miles from the west coast railway still in German hands, and 14 miles from the western shore. The other fought beyond Carentan and was roughly halfway across the peninsula at its narrowest, 20-mile neck. Other Americans captured Le Ham, three miles southwest of Montebourg.

Supreme headquarters described the day's sweeping advances as "very, very satisfactory." Fall of Troarn in a seven-mile advance by the British was the first big gain registered in this desperately-defended area since a British airborne division landed there on a D-Day a week ago. The British in another 31 miles advance won a village on the outskirts of Caen itself.

Air Troops Used New airborne troops were dropped in France. The Germans reported airborne landings on the west coast of the Cherbourg peninsula, presumably as part of a pincers to snip off the cape. The crumbling of Nazi defenses on more than an 80-mile front coincided with unconfirmed reports that Field Marshal Erwin Rommel, the "Desert Fox," had been removed from his command. Five landing strips have been constructed and are in use in France, the air forces announced.

(Continued From Page One) smashing at targets in the Normandy peninsula as well as far inland. Supreme headquarters of the allied expeditionary force announced that five landing strips were in use on the Normandy beachhead.

Yanks Weakened President Roosevelt in a broadcast last night drew a broad picture of what confronts the enemy in the Pacific: "... We have deprived the Japs of the power to check the momentum of our ever-growing and ever-advancing military forces. We have reduced their shipping by more than three million tons. We have overcome their original advantage in the air. We have cut off from a return to the homeland tens of thousands of beleaguered Japanese troops who now face starvation or surrender."

Yank Forces Hack at Jap Fortresses Gen. Douglas MacArthur's airmen, taking off from newly-captured New Guinea bases, struck at Palau—530 miles from the Philippines—and Truk for the second straight day. MacArthur's allied forces also expanded their Biak island holdings against stubborn enemy resistance and, to their rear, maintained steady attacks against Japanese troops on islands stretching for 1500 miles from Bougainville to Dutch New Guinea. Casualties in Dutch New Guinea, MacArthur announced, have accounted for 8705 Japanese in recent weeks. Bombers kept up their daily schedule with an attack on Rabaul in New Britain.

**YANK FORCES HACK AT JAP FORTRESSES**

KRUEGER Associated Press War Editor American sea, air and ground fighters are tirelessly hacking away at Japanese fortresses barring the way to rescue of the Philippines and hard-bested China, allied reports showed today. Nimitz-MacArthur airmen, flying from land and carriers, continued their hand-in-glove assaults on the string of enemy-held islands stretching from Palau to the Marianas group flanking the Philippines on the east. Adm. Chester W. Nimitz reported the second straight day of attacks on Guam, Tinian, Saipan and other Marianas islands by a powerful carrier task force. The details were hidden in radio silence.

**De Gaulle Wins Recognition**

LONDON, June 13 (AP)—General Charles de Gaulle today won recognition of his committee of national liberation as the "provisional government of the French republic" from four governments in exile. Poland, Belgium, Czechoslovakia and Luxembourg announced their actions, and the French leader was seeking the same recognition from all United Nations.

De Gaulle was expected to pay an early visit to France, where the allied invasion has spurred resistance of the underground forces, in the hope of winning public support for his committee and to strengthen his hand before leaving for Washington to seek recognition by the United States. Arthur Larsen of Klamath Falls and his brother, Theodore, of Eugene, have purchased the undertaking business of Charles P. Poole at Eugene, it was learned today.

Larsen will leave Klamath for Eugene this week to take over management of the business. (Continued From Page One) a destroyer and three corvettes were sunk and another damaged.

Jap Losses The Japanese losses included: Sunk—one large oiler, one destroyer, three corvettes, one large cargo ship, one medium cargo ship, and three small cargo vessels; damaged—five medium cargo ships and five escort vessels which were not identified by type. In another assault on a Jap convoy, Nimitz reported, three destroyers and one destroyer-escort and two cargo ships were damaged. This convoy, the Pacific fleet communique said, had been intercepted "several hundred miles away," on Monday. Truk Battered Admiral Nimitz reported also a heavy bombing assault upon Truk atoll in the Caroline Islands before dawn Monday. There American Liberators bombers concentrated their attack upon airfields and the sea plane base, unloading 36 tons of bombs. Three Japanese fighters attempted to halt the attack and damaged one of the American bombers. Despite the damage all planes returned. Meantime in the Central Pacific other planes attacked Naruru, Ocean, Ponape and atolls in the Marshalls on Sunday.
