The first meeting of the newly formed home hospitality committee was held Tuesday, with Mrs. George Adler being appointed general chairman of the group. Her executive committee is Mrs. Melvin Leonard, Mrs. Robert Thompson, Mrs. John Martin, and Mrs. C. V. Rush.

This group is sponsored by the League of Women Voters. The social service and welfare committee, headed by Mrs. Melvin Leonard, started the undertaking.

During the luncheon meeting, which was held at the Pelican cafe, Colonel B. Dubel of the Marine Barracks, Lieut. Jack Noble from Tulelake, Ensign Hodgson of the naval air station, Mrs. Louis Serruys of the Commandos, and Mrs. John Schubert, head of the Junior Hostesses, told of the need for such a committee which would act as a clearing house for home entertainment for men and women here.

"I would like to treat you to a steak dinner," said Michos. As they thanked him for the meal he handed each of them a \$50 check — "for spending money."

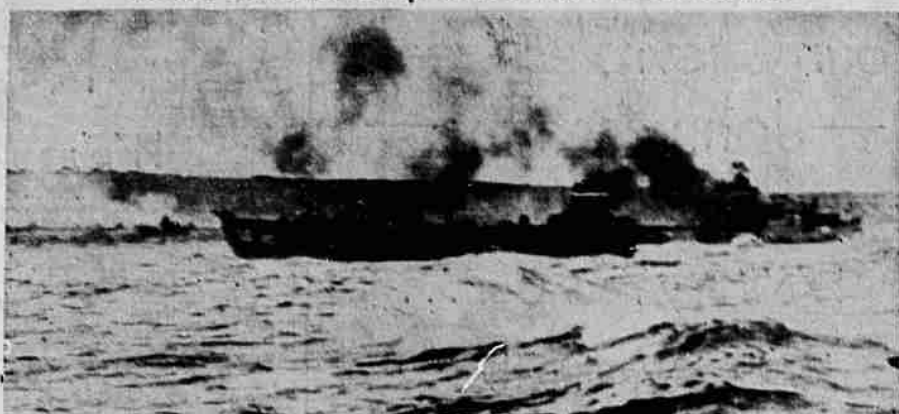
Telephone Books Now Completed

Ten Mitchells Attack Jap Warships Near New Guinea

(Editor's note: Here is the first report of the action, officially described as "one of the finest military feats of the war," in which 10 American medium bombers sank four Japanese destroyers June 8, damaged a fifth and put a cruiser and a sixth destroyer to flight.)

AN ADVANCED FIFTH AIR FORCE BASE OFF DUTCH NEW GUINEA, June 8 (Delayed) (P)—Ten Mitchell medium bombers on reconnaissance high over the western tip of Dutch New Guinea today sighted the trim outlines and dashing wakes of seven Japanese warships racing eastward toward Biak Island, where the Nipponese garrison is in trouble.

It was 1:15 p. m., broken clouds obscured the formation, but the protective covering came too late. The leader of the Mitchells signalled an attack and down the formation lunged for a deadly skip-bombing run.

By 1:30 it was all over. In spite of a hail of defensive fire, the Mitchells had sunk four destroyers and left a fifth smoking and wallowing dead in the water, and had put a cruiser and sixth destroyer to rout.

The performance drew from Maj. Gen. Ennis Whitehead, commanding the fifth air force bomber command, this commendation:

"Congratulations to you all. You men have this date performed one of the finest military feats of the war." The attack was made in the face of 10 to one odds. Three of the Mitchells, including the formation's dashing leader, failed to return.

As the bombers twisted and

weaved toward their target, the major leading the flight radioed:

"My wingman and I will hit the destroyer and cruiser on the left flank and divert their fire. Pick your targets."

A moment later he was heard again for the last time, saying: "So long boys, I'm taking the big one."

Five inch shells riddled his plane as he passed over the cruiser and he fell burning into the sea. His wingman also perished in the wall of flak which the warships were hurling at him. But the diversion succeeded and their sacrifice was not in vain.

Following on the tail of the lead planes were Lt. Wesley A. Strawn, Claringdon, Tex., in "Miss Cue," and Lt. Frederick E. Rimmer, Knoxville, Tenn., piloting "Little Stinker." Strawn's navigator, Lt. Nor-

val D. Jennings, New York City, shouted, "Wes, do you see anything you like?"

"Oh, I'm just shopping around," the Texan laughed as Miss Cue slammed a thousand-pounder square amidships on a destroyer.

Rimmer's tailgunner, Staff Sgt. Robert M. Tenkman, St. Bernard, Ohio, confirmed the kill. "Little Stinker," badly chewed by flak, returned to its base with the left engine hitting on only four cylinders.

POWER PROJECT POLICY ARGUED

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP) — A permanent national policy governing sale and distribution of energy generated at government-owned power projects may be written into the omnibus flood control bill already passed by the house.

Members of a senate commerce subcommittee, headed by Senator Overton (D-La.), considering the \$810,000,000 measure have expressed interest in a proposed amendment of Senator McClellan (Ark.) relating to the Arkansas and White river basins.

Stressing that there is no legislative policy for disposing of government-produced power after the war, McClellan said today his plan might be applied to the whole country.

Interior Secretary Ickes has endorsed the McClellan proposal which stipulates that energy from government projects should first be sold to the government if needed, secondly to cooperatives and similar groups, and finally to private distributors.

"Congress has failed to establish any legislative policy for the disposition of power from many projects such as the Pensacola dam on the Grand river in Oklahoma," said McClellan. "This and a great many other

projects are distributing power under executive orders of the president, with contracts good only until six months after the war. Suppose a new industry served by any of these projects wants to contract for a future supply of power. There is no way the government can arrange it."

Certain major power projects such as Bonneville and the Tennessee valley authority have separate statutory authority to make power commitments beyond end of the war, McClellan said.

Dewey Favored by Indiana Delegates

INDIANAPOLIS, June 14 (AP) — A secret ballot today disclosed that 26 of the 29 Indiana delegates to the republican national convention expressed a preference for Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York as the party's presidential nominee.

One delegate did not vote and two were absent.

The result of the ballot was made known by Ralph W. Gates, former republican state chairman.

The ballot was not considered binding as the state convention did not give them any instructions. In fact, the convention turned down a motion that the delegates be instructed for Dewey.

NAVY ENLISTS WAVE FROM BONANZA
