SHIPPERS ATTACK PREFERENCE RATES

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—Railroad, shipper and trucking industry representatives today urged senate passage of a house-approved bill repealing land grant railroad rates which give the government 50 per cent reductions on war materials and personnel.

With the exception of Benjamin C. Marsh, executive secretary of Peoples' Lobby, Inc., Washington, all witnesses before a senate commerce subcommittee attacked the rates, established to compensate the government for lands granted railroads in the 1850's to induce construction on lines to the west and south.

Marsh urged that the lines be made to prove they were entitled to the relief "before you make this concession."

Railroad witnesses charged the reductions were not justified, that they were discriminatory against shippers not situated along land grant railroads and that the government had been more than compensated for the granted lands. They said further that the cuts made a "fair and just" national rate structure impossible and threatened the postwar security of the roads because of the uncertainty of the amounts the government would recover in disputed claims.

This stand was supported by railroad labor representatives and trucking interests.

Among those supporting repeal of the rates was K. C. Batchelor, traffic manager of the West Coast Lumbermen's association, Seattle.

15-Year-Old Boy Confesses Killing Schoolmate

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., June 14 (AP)—Standing on the threshold of the district courtroom, 15-year-old William Roach tried to plead guilty today to a charge that he had murdered his schoolmate, Carolyn Bennett, 14.

After the charge had been read to him, the boy was asked by the court clerk how he wished to plead and answered, "Guilty," Judge Ralph S. Spooner then directed that a plea of innocent be entered and ordered that the youth be held for hearing on June 21.

Roach was brought into court after a night which included a reenactment of the shooting at the scene and a successful search in the darkness for the revolver allegedly used in the slaying.

Police Chief Raymond P. Gallagher said Roach confessed he shot the girl because she had been "going out with other boys."

Mexican Farmhands To Number 3500

PORTLAND, June 14 (AP)—Mexican farmhands in Oregon will number nearly 3500 by the close of the month, the war food administration said today.

The next trainload of 650 workers will arrive Thursday for work in the pea harvest in the Milton - Freewater and Athena area. Another group of 550 is expected in the state Sunday, and an additional 850 on June 22.

LOGGER KILLED

MARSHFIELD, June 14 (AP)—Paul Berryman, 50, was killed late yesterday by a logging grader after leaping from it in a vain attempt for safety.

The machine went out of control while Berryman was driving it at the Port Orford Cedar company logging camp on Upper Sixes river. Berryman lived alone near the camp.

German Alien in Charge Of Hawaii Construction, Reports House Committee

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—A congressional committee's inquiry into delayed defense preparations at Pearl Harbor produced a report today highlighting descriptions of yachting parties given for the army colonel in charge of construction in Hawaii by a German-born contractor who held war department contracts for the work.

The report, by the house military committee, called on the army for "further explanation" of what it termed "management" on the part of Col. Theodore Wyman Jr., and why the contracts had been awarded to Hans Wilhelm Rohl, then a German alien although he had been a resident of the United States since 1913. He was naturalized, the committee said, only three months before the sneak Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

Asserting there were unexplained delays in construction, particularly in building an aircraft warning system, the report said that had the system been completed on schedule the attack on the Pacific bastion might have been robbed of much of its surprise.

The committee, saying it could not understand "why a man known to be a German alien" was put in charge of the work, devoted a portion of its report to Rohl's personal background, noting that he "bragged of close acquaintance with all visiting German diplomats and persons of high rank."

Wyman and Rohl met in Los Angeles in 1935, the committee stated, and "developed very close social relations" which led, the report added, to parties aboard Rohl's yacht, the "Ramona."

Among entertainment the committee said Rohl provided for the colonel were "wild drinking parties" at which "cheap-looking type of young girls paraded in and out all evening."

The long report contained no conclusions and only brief committee comment. Whether additional reports of the case would be made, said Chairman May (D-Ky.), depends on future developments, adding:

"The next move is up to the war department."

H. Ralph Burton, committee investigator who prepared the report, said his last information was that Rohl still was in business in Los Angeles.

Rohl was a major stockholder in Hawaiian Constructors, a joint contracting venture which held \$125,000,000 in contracts for work in Hawaii, Alaska and South Pacific islands.

Wyman, 56-year-old veteran of the last war, was an engineer officer in charge of defense construction in the Hawaiian and South Pacific areas. He is now stationed overseas.

The committee said that despite knowledge that Rohl was a German alien, the war department, upon Wyman's recommendation, on December 20, 1940, entered into a contract with Hawaiian Constructors to install defense projects in Hawaii "which meant the safety and protection of the United States."

Renewal Forms Mailed by Board

LIMITATIONS RULE EXTENDED BY FE

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—Against the recommendation of the secretaries of war and navy, President Roosevelt today signed legislation extending the limitations of possible restrictions growing out of the Pearl Harbor disaster and directing the services to investigate the proceedings "as the facts may justify."

The measure extends the date of limitations six months from 7-7-44 to 1-7-45.

Presidential Secretary E. A. Tamm announced that the president approved the legislation last night, several days after the June 7 deadline for the trials had expired.

In an accompanying statement, the president expressed confidence that congress would not intend for investigations of the Pearl Harbor raid to interfere with the war effort in any way. It was fear of such interference which prompted the secretary of War Stimson and Secretary of Navy Forrestal to suggest that the president withhold his approval.

While Rear Admiral Hugh E. Kimmel and Maj. Gen. Ter C. Short commanding Pearl Harbor when the Japanese struck, have waived statute of limitations as to their cases, an indefinite number of other persons are affected by the legislation.
