GRANGE NAMES TOMPKINS FOR STATE MASTER

GRANTS PASS, June 14 (AP)—Morton Tompkins was reelected master of the Oregon state grange in convention here this morning. The election was uncontested.

Elmer McClure was reelected overseer; Mrs. G. W. Thieson, Clackamas county, was chosen lecturer to succeed Blanche Pickering, who was not a candidate. Bertha J. Beck was reelected secretary for the 26th year.

Members of the executive committee are Ray W. Gill, Multnomah; Peter Zimmerman, Yamhill, and Allen Wheeler, Lane, who won a majority vote over Henry Gustafson, Coos county incumbent, and Minnie McFarland, Morrow county.

Other officers elected are Roscoe Roberts, Jackson, steward; Arthur Brown, Polk, chaplain; Glen Adams, Polk, treasurer; Arthur H. H. Harny, gate keeper; Pauline Ross, Malheur, Pomona; Bertha Hanscom, Umatilla, Flora.

Run-off elections will be held later today for the office of assistant steward with Ed Hughes, Josephine, and George Murphy, Deschutes, candidates; for Ceres, with Ruth L. Potter, Gilliam, and Hazel Lewis, Umatilla; and for lady assistant steward, Lucy Woodward, Umatilla, and Maria Carnegie, Linn.

Resolutions passed by the convention Tuesday night included recommendations that a "real dirt farmer" serve on the peace council; that money in postwar building should finance public work projects of lasting benefit, and that the state game commission set aside annually a portion of license fees to finance feeding of deer which are starving in eastern Oregon.

The grange protested removal of restriction on sale of colored oleomargarine. They also voted to continue 4-H club work support.
