CAP LAUDED BY C OF C DIRECTORS

Warm commendation of the Klamath Civil Air Patrol was voiced in a resolution at this week's meeting of the Klamath county chamber of commerce directors, after hearing a report on progress made on the CAP-sponsored airport in the Lower Klamath lake district.

Phil Hitchcock, chairman of the chamber's aviation committee, reported that a serviceable airport for civilian use had been developed on Henzel land on the lower lake, and that already there is considerable activity on the field. The project developed after the navy took over the municipal airport and civilian flying from there was prohibited.

Members of the CAP have contributed their time in working on the field, and equipment has been loaned from several places, including Tulana farms and the Ivory Pine company. Hard-packed dirt runways have been constructed and it is now planned to build a temporary hangar for storage of planes.

The chamber resolution recognized the value of keeping civil aviation alive here during the war period, and praised the CAP for its efforts along that line.

Hitchcock also reported on the various applications for commercial airline service to Klamath Falls, stating all are before the CAP and no definite action has been taken.

The chamber meeting featured a long discussion of the proposed unification of the war chest, Boy Scout, Girl Scout, Camp Fire and Salvation Army drives this year. The chamber president was authorized to appoint a committee to work out this project.

Buildings Burned In Gardiner Fire
 GARDINER, Ore., June 15 (AP)—Fire raced through a half-block of this small coastal town early today, razing the three-story Gardiner tavern and the IOOF building and damaging a confectionery store.

All the occupants of the tavern, a 40-room hotel, escaped. A grocery, which was to be sold today, burned to the ground at a loss estimated by owners at \$3000.

The Reedsport fire department and a coast guard fire boat from Umpqua fought two hours before controlling the blaze, apparently started by a burning flue. Owners estimated hotel damage at \$45,000, and the IOOF building loss at \$5000.

KENNY METHOD EVALUATED IN AMA HEARING

CHICAGO, June 15 (AP)—A charge that the public and many doctors have been misled by publicity about the infantile paralysis treatment of Sister Elizabeth Kenny, famous Australian nurse, was made to the American Medical association here today in a report by seven university professors, all physicians.

They also said they acknowledge that the Kenny publicity has stimulated the medical profession to more effective treatment.

The seven were appointed two years ago this June to evaluate the Kenny treatment by the orthopedic section of the American Medical association and by the American Academy of Orthopedic surgeons and the American Orthopedic association.

"There is no evidence," the report said, "that the Kenny treatment prevents or decreases the amount of paralysis. We criticize severely the oft repeated statement of Miss Kenny to patients who have come to her after treatment elsewhere that had his case come to her early the disability would have been prevented. Such statements are not founded on facts."

"Spontaneous recovery in poliomyelitis occurs in many cases. Reports in the medical literature indicate that this varies in different epidemics from 50 to 80 per cent. We have seen many patients receiving the Kenny treatment who showed no muscle involvement at any time, yet she assumes credit for their satisfactory results and does not take into account the factor of spontaneous recovery."

In another place, the report said: "Miss Kenny had repeatedly stated that under 'orthodox' treatment only 13 per cent of the patients recovered without paralysis, while under her treatment over 80 per cent recover. . . . Miss Kenny's statement of 80 per cent recovery under her treatment has not been supported by accurate statistics in a significant number of cases."
