

PLATFORM CONTAIN THREE VIEWS

 The three leading possibilities for the republican nomination—Thomas E. Dewey of New York, Gov. John W. Bricker of Ohio and Lieut. Comdr. Harold G. Stassen—have assurances that their favorite's views will receive consideration by the platform drafters.

Stassen already have conferred with some members of the resolutions committee which will start work on a platform early next week. They are understood to have given general approval to a tentative draft of a foreign plank and to have made their stand on other issues.

Stassen's views will be represented on the committee by Sen. Robert Taft (R-Ohio), who is presently in line to become chairman of the group. Senator E. A. Tamm (R-Minn.) said in Washington today that he plans to appear before the committee to urge it to take a stand for international peace cooperation, in line with the views of Stassen, former Minnesota governor who is serving in the navy.

Sen. Wendell L. Willkie, the 1940 presidential nominee who withdrew from this year's race, has been expressing his views on the platform in a series of newspaper articles and National Chairman E. Spangler announced yesterday at Chicago that Willkie will be invited to the convention and asked to present his views on the platform.

Spangler said the views of former President Hoover and of Gov. Alf M. Landon of Kansas would be solicited on the platform.

The New York Herald Tribune reported that "high democratic political forces" as reported by the president told Party Chairman Robert Hannegan that whether he is nominated again is "something delegates will have to decide" and also that he wants the President Wallace renominated.

Indiana democrats gathered to nominate a state ticket and select convention delegates with 200 votes. Twenty-two of their delegates were chosen in the district last night, two of them on instructions to vote for Mr. Roosevelt.

Daho's close contest for the democratic senatorial nomination, with 99 small and scattered precincts yet to report, shows a 58-vote lead for Cowboy George Glen Taylor over Senator D. Worth Clark. The official canvass June 24 is awaited to determine the winner definitely.

Timber Sale Filed With County Clerk

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 16 (AP)—Contract for sale of approximately 50,000 acres of timber lands in Douglas and Coos counties, including 25,582 acres in Douglas, was filed with the county clerk today providing for sale of the Pillsbury tract to the Weyerhaeuser Timber company.

This stand is reported to be one of the largest on the Pacific coast under one ownership and embraces lands along the summit of the coast range, principally between the Roseburg-Coos highway and the Drain-Reeds highway, covering waterheds of the Coquille, Coos and Umpqua rivers.

STATE GRANGE ENDS FIVE-DAY SESSION

GRANTS PASS, June 16 (AP)—Oregon state grange went into the closing session of its five-day meeting here today after initiating an even 500 into the sixth degree Thursday night, the second largest class in the 71-year history of the state organization.

Construction of a trans-Cascade highway and a road from the southern Oregon coast to the interior as part of postwar building programs was asked in resolutions today.

The Cascade highway would follow the Clackamas river and Oak Grove fork, cutting from Estacada to Madras and would be 1900 feet lower than the present Mt. Hood-Waupinitia pass highway. The second recommendation was for a highway up Chetco river in Curry county to connect the coast with Grants Pass and Medford.
