## Annapolis Chapel Scene of Wedding

In the lovely chapel at Annapolis, Maryland, rich with tradition and the memories of many weddings, Barbara Anne Johnson, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. E. D. Johnson of Klamath Falls, became the bride of Ensign Wayne Stuart Nelson, United States Navy, at six o'clock the evening of Wednesday, June 7. Ensign Nelson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Nelson of Salem.

The chapel organist played several of the young couple's favorites, including "Claire de Lune," before the strains of the wedding march were heard. Barbara walked down the aisle on the arm of Commander John Goodwin, USN, member of the Annapolis faculty. She was lovely in a candlelight satin gown which was worn by her sister, Mrs. William Hopper, at her own wedding last October. The rosepoint lace yoke was embellished with seed pearls and from the bodice a full sweeping skirt fell in a full train. The sleeves were puffed at the shoulder and fitted snugly at the wrist. Barbara's long full train was held at the head with a coronet of pearls and she wore a waist length veil over her face as she approached the lily banked altar. Her Colonial bouquet was fashioned of small white roses, lilies of the valley and delphinium blossoms, with a cascade of satin streamers in which were knotted lilies of the valley.

The Episcopal ring ceremony was read by Chaplain Thomas. The bride's matron of honor was her sister and for the June brides Mary Lou wore a floor length frock of blue marquisette with the new oval neckline outlined with pleating as were the three-quarter length sleeves. The bridesmaids were Sally Godbolt of Redding, California, who attended the University of Oregon with Barbara, and Janice Nelson, sister of the groom. Their frocks were similar to that worn by the matron of honor but were of a light peach shade. All three attendants carried lovely summer flower bouquets and wore bandeaus of frilly horse-hair braid from which fell waist length veils of matching material.
