

Monday Night Class Production Zooms

Second week of the European invasion by allied forces has had its reverberations at the surgical dressings project at Red Cross rooms on Main street and last Monday night's class was the largest since the room was opened for those who have found it inconvenient to come in the day time but yet want to get in their hours.

Sixty men and women registered for work last Monday night and turned out over 1400 dressings which is a commendable report. There is also a class on Thursday nights and the room has a capacity for 85. Both men and women are urged to come and work. There is plenty of gauze on hand at the present time, officials report.
