

SEGREGATION CENTER HOLDS GRADUATION

NEWELL—One hundred and fifty young men and women graduated tonight from the Tuolumne Segregation center high school. The graduation was for a mid-year term because schools at the segregation center had been interrupted following a disturbance last November. This is the first graduation from the segregation center schools operated by the war relocation authority. The graduates for the most part are sons and daughters of persons who indicated their desire to return to Japan. Many of these school pupils have never been to Japan and are in the segregation center because of family considerations. All are American citizens.

Harry L. Black, assistant project director, delivered the commencement address. Several of the graduates received honor awards.

Interesting Stories About Klamath Animals and Efforts in Their Behalf

Last week a question came to me over the telephone about rabies, and it occurred to me that many of the readers might be interested.

In the first place there has never been a case of rabies in Klamath Falls that either Dr. Rozendal of the health center or the humane society knew of, since the incorporation in 1936. We have had a few cases under observation but none of them developed any symptoms. The first and most important rule, if you have occasion to suspect that an animal is a victim, is NOT TO KILL IT.

Keep it under observation for ten days and then if you want to be completely reassured, take it to a veterinary for final examination. If another animal has been bitten, keep it under observation also. In this way you are completely protected.

Poor Squeaky is lost! He has just come to Klamath Falls from Grants Pass where he lived out in the country. He is a black cocker spaniel, 11 years old and some years ago one of his hind legs was broken, so that he walks with a limp. He must be feeling very lonely, to say nothing of being hungry and thirsty.

If any of you find him will you call 5672 and report it so that we may return him to his family? I am sure that when they find him, they will buy him a license so that he may be identified if he ever gets lost again.

MAINE BALLOT TESTS POWER OF CIO GROUP

The strength of the CIO political action committee in Maine was tested at the polls today as voters picked party nominees for three house seats and governor.

In the first congressional district, which includes the shipbuilding cents of Portland and Bath, republican Andrew A. Pettis, president of the Portland CIO shipyard local, was trying for both major party nominations with the endorsement of Maine's united labor committee. The incumbent, Robert Hale, a republican is seeking renomination.

Since Maine's general election comes early, Sept. 11, state results have been watched in the past as a possible weathervane indicating national trends.

Politicians also centered their attention on Chicago, where the republican post war advisory committee on agriculture continued its sessions preliminary to the party's nominating convention which opens June 26. The resolutions committee, which will draft the platform, starts sessions Wednesday.

At distinctly separate press conferences yesterday in the convention city, Roy D. Moore predicted Gov. John W. Bricker of Ohio would be nominated for president because he is the "most likely to win the election" and Ruth Hanna McCormick Simms said she expects a first ballot nomination for Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York, helped by what she called strong western support.

Nevada democrat will name eight delegates Saturday, the same day Colorado party members pick 1p. In Idaho that day, the close race between D. Worth Clark, the incumbent, and Glen Taylor in last week's democratic senatorial primary will be canvassed, with the official count needed to determine the winner.

Chicago was the scene of further political activity as the anti-administration American democratic national committee held a two-day caucus to consider plans for the opening session. Chairman Gleason L. Archer said "the time has come for a house cleaning in America and that the first house that should be cleaned is the White House in Washington."

Food Cost Increase Noted in Portland

PORTLAND, June 19 (AP)—Food costs increased 1.8 percent here for the month ended May 15, William A. Bledsoe, regional director of the U. S. Bureau of Labor statistics, said today. Chiefly responsible for the gain were fresh fruits and vegetables, up more than 7 per cent. Onions, carrots, oranges, lettuce and apples led the advance.

Seattle showed a corresponding increase of 1.5 percent; San Francisco 1.8; Los Angeles 2.5. Portland food costs, however, were nearly 6 percent lower than a year ago, Bledsoe said, although 50.8 percent above pre-war levels.

AMERICAN CANTEENS HELP ALLIED FORCES

SALEM—Mobile canteens and ambulances donated by Americans in many parts of the United States are being used to serve allied troops departing from English quaysides and returned as the first casualties from the Normandy beachheads, according to information received by the British War Relief society, a member agency of the National War Fund. Contributions to the Klamath County War Chest help make possible the work of this organization in England.

A cablegram from British War Relief headquarters in London states that the Women's Legion of the society has maintained a 24-hour service at the docks ever since the invasion started, and that American-contributed vehicles are playing an important role in providing food and transportation for American troops.

Contractors Make Fast Progress

BEND, June 19 (AP)—Contractors boring the Smith rock tunnels are making such fast progress that Deschutes river water now is expected to be available for the southern unit of the Madras irrigation project next summer.

One of the tunnels has been driven 600 feet into the cliffs overlooking the Crooked river gorge east of Terrebonne. The second, which will be 3300 feet long, has progressed 400 feet.
