Mack Lillard has announced a special bond selling feature for next Friday's show. Anyone who buys a \$25 War Bond on Friday, June 23, and presents this bond or a receipt for it at the box office will be given a ticket for a seat in the balcony upon paying the federal tax.

Anyone who buys a \$50 War Bond or more on Friday, will be given a seat downstairs for the price of the federal tax.

Lillard says he expects a sell-out crowd with possibly 400 people getting in via the War Bond route.

Dixie Leads Swatsmiths, But He's Missing Oftener

NEW YORK, June 20 (AP)—Dixie Walker's bat, a month ago the most potent weapon in Major league baseball, has acquired its owner's soft, southern accent.

Four weeks ago the Brooklyn outfielder was batting an amazing .444 but the figures have shrunk to .388 at present. A week ago Walker had .416 but he collected only six blows in his last 30 times at bat, including last night's game.

Despite his collapse, however, he remains at the top of the Major league swatsmiths as Thurman Tucker, Chicago White Sox outfielder, skidded from .398 to .371 while retaining the leadership in the American league.

While the two leaders were taking their lumps during the week, Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals, added to his aggregate. Right now the fleet outfielder, the National loop's top hitter a year ago, has climbed to .377 from .348 two weeks ago.

Chuck Hostetter, ancient newcomer with the Detroit Tigers, is the newest threat to Tucker. A week ago the bengal outfielder was sixth with .325 but he pushed his average up 11 points in seven days and now stands next to the Chicagoan.

Oris Hockett of Cleveland, erstwhile runner up, now is fifth following a 37 point drop that stopped at .324.

Angels Drop Dying Ducks

The Angels took undisputed possession of sixth place, half a game ahead of Oakland, and Portland dropped to fourth position from a tie with Hollywood for third. It was the only regular game scheduled. Other teams resuming play tonight.

Steady pitching by George Camellas of the Angels, who kept seven hits well scattered, handed the Beavers their eighth consecutive defeat. Cecil Garrhart of the Angels hit a home run in the third inning.

At Hollywood 2500 fans who purchased \$1,500,000 worth of war bonds saw Red Ruffing's Sixth Ferry Group, of Long Beach, defeat the Stars, 7 to 1, in an exhibition game.

In another exhibition at San Francisco an army all-star outfit composed of players from various military establishments in the bay area defeated the league leading Seals, 5 to 1.

Giants Zoom Into Second Place Tie

Hapless Dodgers Victims Of The Pulverizing Polo Grounders In Only Tilt

By TED MEIER Associated Press Sports Writer Melt Ott's New York Giants, whose earlier five and seven-game winning streaks startled baseball experts, are still the surprise of the National league.

The Polo Grounders climbed into a virtual tie for second place with the Pittsburgh Pirates by walloping Brooklyn, 10 to 2, last night in the day's only major league game.

The Giants now have won 30 and lost 25 games for .545 percentage. Pittsburgh officially is credited with 28 wins against 22 losses for .560. Counting another Pirate defeat, from their unfinished game of May 21 with the Phils, reduces the Pittsburgh edge to a mere four percentage points. The May 21 game was called after eight innings with the Phils ahead, 9-4.

A crowd of 25,140 paid at Ebbets field to see the Giants walloping the Brooks for the seventh time in 11 tries. Hal Gregg, starting Brooklyn pitcher, was stung for six runs in a big second inning that made things easy for Harry Feldman, Giant right-hander.

Only one of the six runs was earned, Bobby Bragan and Dixie Walker contributing two costly errors. Sandwiched around the misplays were two walks and singles by Gus Mancuso, Nap Reyes, Joe Medwick and Billy Jurges. Feldman batted in a seventh run in the next inning and battled Brooklyn's relief twirler, Cal McLish, on even terms the rest of the way.

A scheduled afternoon game between Washington and the New York Yankees was rained out. The other clubs had an open date.
