

PUBLIC USE OF SWIM POOL NOW POSSIBLE

The high school natatorium will be open to the general public from 1 o'clock until 10 p. m. on Saturdays and Sundays starting June 24.

An admission price of 50 cents will be made to adults and high school students who are working during the summer. Servicemen will be admitted for half price.

No grade school children or others who have been swimming during the week under the summer recreation program will be allowed to swim on Saturdays and Sundays.

A charge of 25 cents will be made to rent bathing suits and five cents will be charged to rent a towel.

According to Dave Bridge, city recreation officer, this is a trial program that will be attempted for a few weeks to see if there is enough attendance to warrant opening the pool at night to the civilian populace.

A certified instructor and lifeguard will be on duty at all times. At first there will be nothing but free swimming. However, if enough interest is shown and the demand is great enough, adults will have regular classes where they will be taught to swim just as the youngsters are now.

EXTRA PAY VOTED TWO ARMY BRANCHES

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—Extra pay for infantrymen and gliderborne troops was voted today by the house military committee after it heard an off-the-record eulogy of G. I. Joes by one of their leaders on a fighting front.

The committee approved legislation to give "expert infantrymen" engaged in combat duty a pay boost of \$10 monthly, those not in combat an additional \$5 and members of glider units the same 50 per cent pay increase now given paratroopers.

Major Gen. Miller G. White read a letter in support of the bill from a front-line commander commending Uncle Sam's foot-soldiers.

At their own request, the marines were excluded from provisions of the legislation.

Col. J. W. Knighton, representing the marine corps, said in a statement filed with the committee that the bill singles out one arm of the services, the infantry, to the detriment of other arms engaged in equally hazardous jobs. To apply it to the leathernecks, he added, would "tend to destroy a sense of unity which is a valuable military asset to the corps."

Aluminum Workers Sign Agreement

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 21 (AP)—C. L. Smith, secretary of the AFL Aluminum Trades Council, announced today the signing of a work agreement with the Aluminum Company of America and the war labor board that is expected to stabilize work conditions at the aluminum plant here.

Union and company officials also announced they had submitted to the WLB for approval an agreement covering a general wage increase.

War Manpower Shortages Drop

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—Employment in war manufacturing industries has dropped an average of 100,000 workers a month this year, the commerce department reports.

Jobs in non-war industries have declined almost 50,000 a month the report said, adding: "Manpower shortages in some individual plants persist, but the general trend is downward."

The department predicted this trend would continue in war industries, but that employment in non-war jobs would remain about the same during the second half of this year.

Body Recovered From Ocean

MARSHFIELD, Ore., June 21 (AP)—Ten-year-old Robert McCoy, who fell into the ocean from a Coos Head cliff Sunday, suffered a skull fracture before drowning, W. O. Campbell, county coroner, said today.

Coastguardsmen brought the body here. They discovered it below the cliff, where Monday morning they found Richard Jones, 8, North Bend, wandering dazed. He told them he had tried to swim to the aid of his Charleston, Ore., hiking companion.

DISTRICTS APPROVE NEW SCHOOL TAXES

Strengthened Oregon schools in the postwar period appeared certain today, as new districts joined the list of cities which have approved special school taxes.

Eugene voters accepted a 1.3-mill levy, expected to raise \$19,000, by a margin of 7 to 1. Oregon City, in an election which drew only a handful of voters, approved a 7-mill tax to be levied annually for the first five postwar years to raise \$200,000 for school improvement.

Tabulations of two-thirds of the vote in Lincoln county indicated passage by 5 to 1 of the \$3,200 school tax levy to meet expenses above the 6 percent limitation.

Both Klamath Falls and Klamath county approved special levies yesterday.

16 Per Cent Mark Hit by Fifth Loan

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—The Fifth War Loan has pushed past the 16 per cent mark in the drive for individual bond purchases.

Sales to individuals through Monday, seventh day of the campaign, totaled \$964,000,000 toward their quota of \$6,000,000,000, the treasury announced.

The total goal is \$18,000,000,000. Only individuals' purchases will be credited to the drive until the end of this week, second in the four-week campaign.

Walker Says Money Not Answer to Rehabilitation

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 21 (AP)—Pensions, bonuses and other financial aids are not the answer

to rehabilitation and readjustment of men returning from the current war, Don V. Walker, Newport, chairman of the national finance committee of the disabled American veterans, declared here today, opening the 23rd state DAV convention.

Speaking to the approximately

200 registered delegates and visitors, Walker declared that the responsibility for absorbing disabled veterans of the present war into normal peacetime life will fall chiefly upon big industry, and that the civilian population must change ways of liv-

ing to assure opportunities for the returning soldiers.
