

POWER POLICY OUTLINED BY CHAMBER ACT

Klamath chamber of commerce directors went on record today against a section of a proposed United States chamber declaration that favors sale of government-produced power only at the point of production.

The directors, on a split vote, favored striking one sentence from a declaration which was otherwise approved. The approved portions favor use of government-produced power in regional power pools for the greatest general benefit.

In the discussion, it was argued that the proposed declaration would be favorable to areas near the government power dams, and unfavorable to areas farther removed from them. While those speaking for striking the sentence said they are not against private power distribution, they are concerned about a policy which would prohibit government distribution lines and might therefore prevent distribution of the government-produced power over wide areas.

The approved portions of the declaration favor use of government-produced power in regional power pools for the greatest general benefit.

The chamber directors also have approved, in general, the United States chamber policy advocating legislative policies respecting development and use of water resources affording full opportunity to private enterprise to participate in such development and to purchase, use or re-sell products, goods and services, including power, that result from water use and control projects developed by the government.

Lars Carlson, representing the committee for economic development, addressed the directors and announced the appointment of Wallace Bruce as Klamath chairman for that committee.

Carlson explained his organization is promoting a private enterprise program to meet the economic problems that will burst on the nation at the close of the war. He declared the great war debt can be liquidated if America maintains high production and distribution in the post-war period. He painted a rosy picture of economic development in the northwest.

Hague two miles south of Acqueville.

Tanks Destroyed
Eighty nazi tanks have been destroyed by the allied liberating armies to date, supreme headquarters said.

Heavy fighting was reported in the Tilly-Sur-Seulles area near the center of the front, and an American spearhead to the west had pushed within two miles of St. Lo, communications hub of Normandy.

The assault upon the two forts of Cherbourg sprang forward from St. Martin Le-Grand, four miles south of the port.

Fort Du Roule, a major key to control of the besieged German stronghold, stands atop a 450-foot hill.

Last Stand
The French worked for more than a century building up Cherbourg's forts and defenses and the Germans now are making a last stand in the inner ring—which embraces part of the city itself.

German defenses have stiffened and there are indications the nazi high command has ordered a house-to-house fight by some 25,000 to 30,000 Germans now left with virtually no chance to escape. Allied broadcasts last night urged the trapped garrison to surrender.

Although the three main roads to Cherbourg from the south run into one main highway bottleneck just outside the city, the American troops apparently were closing in from three sides—south, west and east.

Towns Taken
Communique No. 31 from supreme headquarters this morning announced that the towns of Valognes; Les Pieux, Couville and Rauville la Bigot were in allied hands, but the advance American line runs some distance beyond these points.

The suburban and city area which now has become a battlefield has an estimated population of 60,000. The population of the city proper, according to latest reports, is approximately 33,400 and an additional 27,000 live in the suburbs.

Despite German reports, the supreme allied command said it has no knowledge that allied warships were shelling Cherbourg from the sea and declared such an attack was unlikely.

Coastal Forts
The port is protected by seven heavy coastal forts which should be much simpler to take by land assault than from the sea.

Only patrol activity was reported elsewhere on the Normandy beachhead except in the Tilly-Sur-Seulles area.

The British announced the capture of Onchy, three and a half miles southwest of Tilly. At the same time the Germans launched three heavy counterattacks on the newly taken British stronghold of Hottot, two miles south of Tilly. The attacks were reported held, but the situation in the village itself was obscure.

Caen Quiet
The Caen area even farther to the east was quiet.

A gale continued to blow in the channel. Six-foot waves whipped over the invasion beaches, making unloading of supplies impossible for the time being.

Bad weather hampered aircraft over the battle area, but fighter-bombers blasted Cherbourg guns and forts. Many of

PORTLAND SHIPYARDS BEST IN NATION, SAYS ADM. VICKERY

PORTLAND, June 21 (AP)—Rear Admiral Howard L. Vickery, vice chairman of the U. S. maritime commission, today described the Portland area shipyards, built up from nothing since the war began, as the best in the nation.

"You have done the grandest job in the whole country for us," Vickery, here on a coast-wide inspection trip, told interviewers.

Predicting no decline in the shipbuilding pace, Vickery said maritime commission yards in this area already have sufficient work to occupy all employees for at least another year, and will continue to receive new contracts.

Polletti New AMG Commissioner

ROME, June 21 (AP)—Lt. Col. Charles Polletti assumed the post of allied military government commissioner for the Rome region today, succeeding Col. Norman E. Fiske who took the job temporarily.

Polletti first was commissioner for Sicily, then assumed charge of AMG administration in Naples, where he made important strides in returning the city to more normal conditions.

Fiske, who took over temporarily in Rome after the departure of Brig. Gen. Edgar Hume with the fifth army in the advance northward, will return to his regular job as deputy executive commissioner of the allied control commission.

Jones Arraigned In Justice Court

Allen Elie Jones, who was brought to Klamath Falls from Oregon City this week to answer charges of assault and robbery while armed with a dangerous weapon, has been arraigned in justice court.

In court Jones waived preliminary hearing and was committed to the county jail under \$2500 cash bail. The defendant is accused of taking \$800.

Public Debt Passes Milestone

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—The public debt of the United States has passed another milestone—\$190,000,000,000.

At the close of business June 19, today's treasury statement showed, it was \$190,057,000,000 compared with \$140,104,000,000 a year ago.

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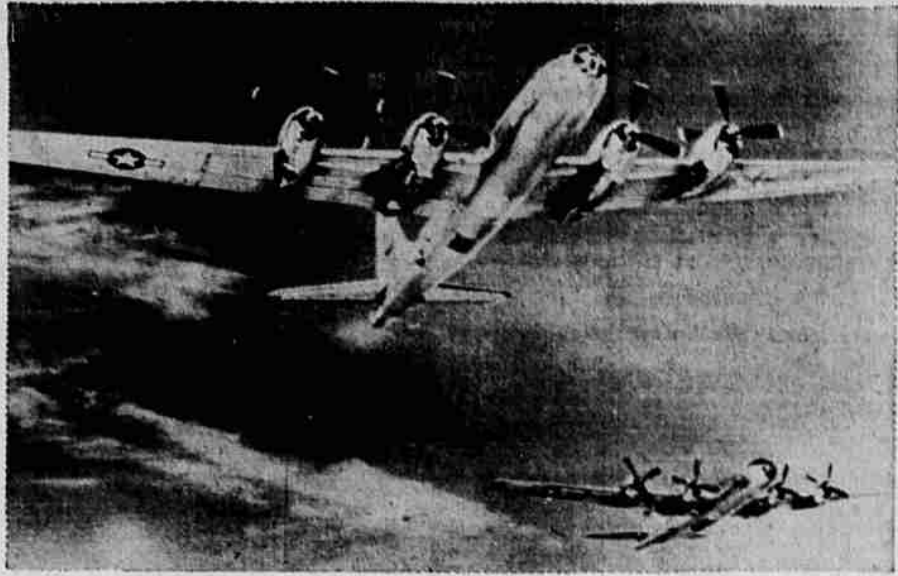

Mrs. Gurney will remain in Albany with her two daughters. The kidnaped baby was found safe in the home of an army sergeant's wife after days of state-wide searching.

Ted Case was appointed county service officer by the county court in session Wednesday. The post is a new county office, inaugurated this year. Funds have been provided for it in the proposed 1944-45 county budget.

Main duties of the service officer will be to aid in the rehabilitation of returning discharged service men.

Second Division
This was the second German division to be diverted from the western front since the allies' spectacular advance in Italy began, the 20th Luftwaffe division having arrived here previously from Denmark. Prisoners also have been taken in the same general area from the 16th division which was brought here from the Balkans.

Mediterranean air force headquarters announced Thunderbolts of the first tactical air force severely damaged an enemy aircraft carrier in Genoa harbor believed to be an Italian ship being refitted.

Tactical aircraft flew 750 sorties yesterday over the battle area and all returned.

Chase Nazis
After clearing the university city of Perugia, eighth army troops headed after them withdrawing Germans in several directions. They soon occupied high ground northwest of the city. Forward elements northeast of Perugia reached a point some five miles from the city limits.

The occupation of Perugia was carried out by a column led by the 16th and 5th Lancers, famous British cavalry regiments now armored.

Farther west eighth army troops were astride highway 71 northeast of Lake Chiusi and the towns of Chiusi and Cetona were cleared of the enemy.

Motorized forces were greatly handicapped by three days of heavy rains which made some roads impassable.

INCREASE GRANTED IN IRON, STEEL

WASHINGTON, June 31 (AP)—The war production board today authorized increased use of iron and steel in the manufacture of galvanized ware for civilians. WPB also removed restrictions on the types of iron and steel that may be used.

Increases range from 7 1/2 to 25 per cent over previous allotments.

Eight classes of galvanized ware now may be made for civilians. They include garbage cans, pails and buckets, wash tubs, storage cans for petroleum, fire shovels, funnels and coal stoves.

In making any of these items, manufacturers may use as much iron and steel as they did in the year ending June 30, 1941.

MARINES TO ARRIVE FOR TREATMENT

The largest draft for the Klamath Marine Barracks so far, numbering 330 men, will arrive from the south Thursday.

From the local railroad station the men will be taken immediately to the barracks, where they will be screened and most of them will receive 30-day overseas furloughs.

Those in need of funds will be eligible for loans from the Red Cross.

The men are just back from overseas.

Pownall Awarded Service Medal

U. S. PACIFIC FLEET HEADQUARTERS, Pearl Harbor, June 21 (AP)—Rear Adm. Charles A. Pownall, commander of the Pacific fleet air force, was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal today by Adm. Chester W. Nimitz.

The award was for exceptionally meritorious service as the task force commander in the Gilbert Islands campaign and the subsequent carrier raid on the Marshalls.

The rapid advance up the Adriatic coast put patrols at the Menocchia river and at the town of Ascoli Piceno, provincial capital with a population of 42,000 in peacetime. The fishing port of San Benedetto del Tronto, which formerly had a population of 20,000 and village of Cossignano 10 miles inland were occupied.

50 Mile Advance
The occupation of Grottomare, population 5800, represented an advance of some 50 airline miles along the coastal highway, the last 16 miles made despite heavy rain.

In the western coastal sector where the Americans still were punching forward, Montepescali, which dominated the junction highways 71 and 73 was taken despite stiff delaying action. Castel del Piano, also hotly defended, was taken yesterday.

ZERO PLANE DISPLAY SET FOR KLAMATH

With its propeller blades twisted grotesquely and its leading edges badly dented, a Japanese Zero fighter plane will arrive in Klamath Falls Friday morning to give this city its first glimpse of the widely publicized and deadly war plane technically known as the Mitsubishi 00.

The war prize now touring the country in the interest of naval welfare will be placed on display in a tent at the corner of 8th near Main, where it will be open for public inspection daily from 10 a. m. to 10 p. m. for three days up to and including next Sunday night.

The exhibition and national tour of the Zero are sponsored by the Naval Aid auxiliary, a non-profit welfare organization that functions under Registry D-19 of the war relief control board and under charter of the 11th naval district.

Funds derived from the small admission fee charged to see the Zero go toward maintaining hospitals, nurseries, canteens and for general welfare of sailors, marines, coast guardsmen and their families in the 11th, 12th and 13th naval districts.
