

ROOSEVELT SIGNS BILL OF RIGHTS

WASHINGTON, June 22 (AP)—President Roosevelt today signed a bill of rights setting up a vast government aid program for veterans of this war. With congressional leaders and heads of veterans' organizations looking on, the chief executive put his signature to the measure authorizing federal loans, housing, job insurance, schooling and other ex-service benefits estimated to cost between \$3,000,000,000 and \$6,500,000,000.

The president said the bill carries out most of the recommendations he has made for veterans' aid and notifies the members of the armed forces that the people of the nation will not let them down. He urged additional war service legislation, however, to give veterans social security credit toward old age pensions for the time served in the armed forces and to provide education and unemployment compensation benefits for members of the merchant marine. What veterans want more than anything, he said, is assurance of employment after the war.

Presidentially he urged the congress to hasten work on legislation providing compensation for war workers during the industrial shift from war to peace-time manufacturing and recommended prompt action on legislation to provide for the orderly disposal of postwar surpluses.

Seal Skins to Be Taken From Islands

WASHINGTON, June 22 (AP)—Between 60,000 and 70,000 Alaska seal skins will be taken this summer from the Pribilof Islands where the United States government owns the largest seal herd in the world.

Interior Secretary Ickes said today that last year the record number of 117,000 skins were taken to make up for 1942, when no skins were obtained because of military operations near the Alaska in the Bering sea off Alaska.

The herd now numbers about 175,000 animals.

Will Rogers' Widow Dies

SANTA MONICA, Calif., June 22 (AP)—Will Rogers' widow, whom he courted on a bicycle and whom he called "my sweetheart," is dead.

Mrs. Betty Blake Rogers, 65, succumbed at the Rogers ranch home in Santa Monica canyon last night. Relatives said she had been ill for several weeks, and that she suffered a severe attack of influenza in Washington, D. C., during the winter.

CASUALTIES NEAR QUARTER MILLION

WASHINGTON, June 22 (AP)—American battle casualties are nearing the quarter-million mark.

Secretary Stimson reported today that army casualties through June 6 (which would include D-day) totaled 178,677, an increase of 6319 since his report

on June 8, which covered the period through May 21. The army dead now total 31,289, an increase of 2337. The new announcement reports 71,432 wounded, 39,976 missing and 35,980 prisoners.

A navy casualty list announced today reports an overall figure of 46,705, an increase of 932 since a list published two weeks ago. Those killed total 20,044, an increase of 242. Wounded amount to 12,905, missing 9,295 and prisoners 4,461.

American army ground forces fighting in Italy since the land-

ings last September suffered casualties totaling 64,992 through June 15. This was an increase of 2951 since a report last week which covered the period through June 5. The dead in the Italian campaign now total 11,610, an increase of 507. Wounded are 44,426 and missing 8056. In the same period, air forces in this theater operating in Italy and in strategic missions deep into Europe have had 9052 casualties of which 1186 were killed, 1373 wounded and 6493 missing. This was the first time air force casualties in the Italian theater have been announced separately.
