CLASS ONE-A RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT EYED

A one-A residential classification has been recommended by the city planning commission for a part of the property in the Hot Springs district which runs just adjacent to the proposed new route of highway 97.

The area included in the one-A classification will be Eldorado avenue from Portland street north to Frankford's wood yard on the present highway 97. The plan which would make this the most exclusive residential district in Klamath Falls, was presented to the city council at its meeting this week.

According to present specifications, the property, most of it city-owned, would be divided into 16 double lots each with an area of 14,000 square feet, on which a tenant can not build a house of less than 1000 square feet. The one-A classification creates a new zone with stricter regulations than an ordinary class one district.

Also to be changed, according to the planning commission's recommendation, is a part of Eldorado street running south of Portland avenue. This is to be changed from its present class two classification to a class one district. The city fathers have gone on record as being in favor of the planning commission's recommendation.
