

GOP POLISHES PLANS FOR CONVENTION

Republicans worked today to clean up preliminary plans for their convention in Chicago starting Monday, while in Washington Democrats speculated on whether President Roosevelt is under-estimating the threatened "revolt" in his party down south.

At Chicago, the republican resolutions committee listened to advocates of varied proposals for platform use as the party's national committee wound up hearings on delegation contests.

The presidential nomination issue, which National Chairman Harrison E. Spangler says will be settled by next Wednesday, produced a statement from backers of Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York that party leaders from 22 states and two territories are behind a "draft Dewey" movement.

John W. Bricker of Ohio told reporters he is in the race to the finish and expects to be nominated.

On the democratic side, much interest was aroused in Washington by a report from Governor Ellis Arnall of Georgia that President Roosevelt told him he was "very pleased" to hear that prospects are good for the re-election of Senator Walter F. George, 1938.

George has continued to oppose some administration proposals and the president's reported remark led to the speculation about mollifying democrats down south who have complained, and acted, against the administration.

Governor Arnall, in addition to his report on George, predicted that President Roosevelt will be nominated for a fourth term and said he may make known his willingness to run by means of a public statement shortly after the republican convention. Arnall disparaged the talk of party revolt in the south.

New Aluminum Alloy Developed

PITTSBURGH, June 23 (AP)—The Aluminum company of America today said a new aluminum alloy, developed after 18 years of research and having twice the compressive yield strength of the common structural steel, now is being produced for at least eight airplane manufacturers.

The new alloy, called "75," was described by Dr. Francis G. Frary, Alcoa research director, as 90 per cent aluminum with magnesium and zinc the alloying elements.

MEN AND WOMEN IN SERVICE

Lt. R. E. Veatch, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Veatch of 1950 Earle, has written from England where he is the pilot of a transport plane. He has been overseas since February. The following is part of the letter written to his parents telling of his visit to the estate of the Duke of Portland:

"I had quite an experience yesterday, so will tell you about it. About 20 of us were invited to spend the day on the grounds of the Duke of Portland. He, by the way, is the most influential peer in England outside of the royal family. His place here consists of 38,000 acres and contains among other things, the remains of Sherwood forest. So one of the interesting things we saw was the hunting grounds of Robin Hood. Of course he now has his own private home on the grounds that is new and in itself contains 65 rooms, but the most interesting building is the old abbey that was built in the year 1152. This is where he keeps his private collections, among which is the finest collection of silver plate in the world, nearly all of it being possessions of former kings or presents from the various royal families. Also he has Marie Antoinette's writing table, Henry VIII's dagger, the robes and communion cup used by Charles I on the day of his execution, and other priceless things too numerous to mention. We were the first group ever to have the privilege of seeing all of this, outside of nobility. Not only that, but I had a little personal chat with him, and he gave me his phone number and extended an invitation any time I want to go back, and I hope to do so in the very near future."

POLITICAL ACTIVITY BILL APPROVED

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—House acceptance of a modified ban against political activity by agriculture department employees sent to the White House today the \$662,145,918 agriculture supply bill for the fiscal year starting July 1.

As worked out by a senate-house conference committee, the political action clause prohibits use of any funds for the salaries of employees who violate the Hatch anti-politics act for the statute prohibiting legislative activity, such as lobbying, by government workers while on government time.

In addition, it provides for dismissal of any war food administration employee found, after hearings, to have "demanded that a farmer join the triple A program as a condition for draft deferment or for the granting of a priority certificate" for gasoline or any other rationed article.

The house originally wrote into the appropriations measure an outright ban against any political activity by agriculture department workers, but the senate struck it out. This week the house voted 219 to 123 to insist upon its retention.

Peterson has been a member of the public welfare commission since its organization a number of years ago and was chairman of the commission during the last four-year term.

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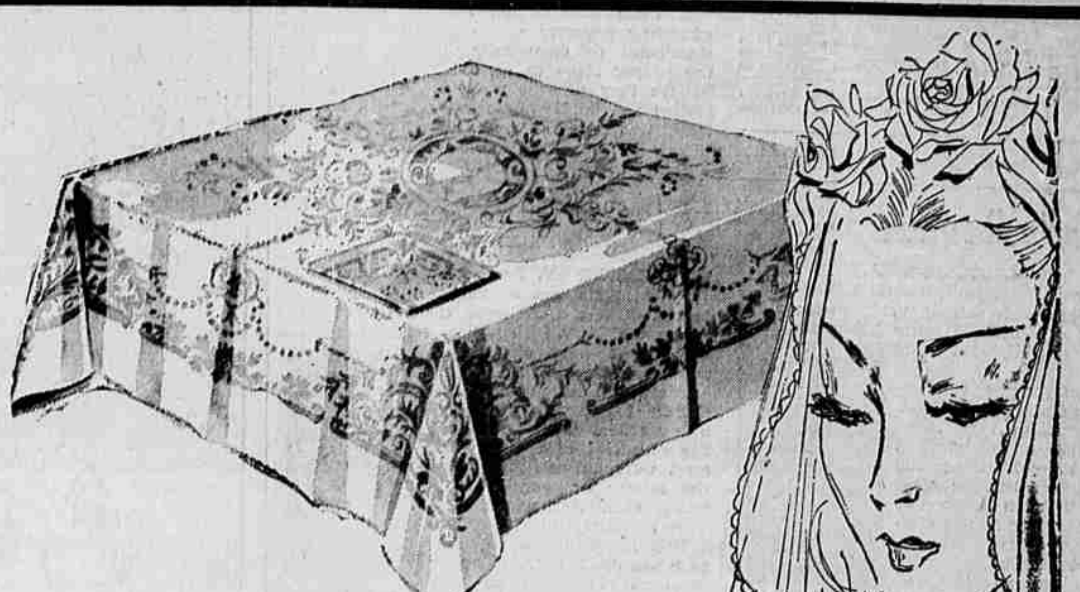
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Television Has Sliver "Eye"
