Sacramento Takes Third Out of Four From Seals; Ducks Take Errorful Game

Sacramento did some more juggling from the cellar of the Pacific Coast baseball league last night, taking the third game out of the four in the current series with the first place San Francisco Seals, 2 to 1.

Portland moved into a second place tie with Seattle, knocking Los Angeles into seventh spot in a contest so full of errors that the fans started booing. The Bevs won, 15 to 6, on 19 hits, and committed four errors to five for Los Angeles.

San Diego pulled into a percentage tie with fourth-place Hollywood, beating the Stars 2 to 1 in the tightest game of the night.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 24 (AP)—Flooring his game opponent three times in the early going and putting him away for keeps with a hard right to the stomach, Leo (The Lion) Turner, Portland negro scrapper, scored a six-round knockout over Joey Albina, shipyard battler, to win scheduled 15-round fracas for the Oregon middleweight boxing title.

Turner dropped Albina for a fourth count in the third and for nine counts in the fourth and fifth.

"Moose" Kennedy, 191, Vancouver, Wash., scored a 10-round decision over Billy Sullivan, 186 1/2, Washington, D. C., in the semi-windup. Sullivan was down for a seven count in the first round.

Eddie Weller, 145, Portland, outpointed Billy McCann, 146 1/2, Seattle, in an eight-round go while Joe Boone, 143, Seattle, came back after being floored four times in the first and second rounds to score a three-round TKO over Rocky Bobley, 146, Portland.

George (Snuffy) Stirnweiss, second baseman of the New York Yankees, not only has filled the shoes of Joe Gordon to everybody's satisfaction, but is stealing everything in sight with them.

The former North Carolina university athlete was responsible for all his team's runs, besides pilfering his 16th base in 18 attempts, as the Yankees defeated the Philadelphia Athletics, 5-1.

The victory enabled the world champions to climb back into a tie for third place with the Chicago White Sox.

Sigmund Jakucki hurled his second successive shutout against Detroit to give the league leading St. Louis Browns a 5-0 victory. He blanked the Tigers by the identical score last Saturday.

Large Crowd to See Navy, Camp White Tangle

A large crowd is expected to be on hand Sunday, June 24, to see the Naval Air station baseball squad tangle with the best team in the Camp White circuit.

ASHLAND PIONEER DIES AT HOME

Mrs. Henrietta Kahn Hosley, pioneer resident of Ashland and mother-in-law of Mrs. Maude Hosley of Klamath Falls, died in Ashland Wednesday following a lengthy illness.

Mrs. Hosley was born September 25, 1861, at Jefferson, Wis., and was married in 1880 to Charles Henry Hosley. They came to Oregon in 1884. Mr. Hosley passed away January 21, 1918, at his home in Ashland.

Mrs. Hosley was buried Thursday in the Ashland cemetery by the side of her husband and four sons, Mrs. Maude Hosley, with her nephew and niece, Mr. and Mrs. Ermel Hosley, Mrs. Carey M. Ramsby and Mrs. Charles J. Martin attended final rites for the beloved pioneer who was 83 years of age at the time of her passing.

Also surviving are four grandsons. They are Ermel H. Hosley, mail specialist 3/c with the navy; T/S Robert L. Hosley, now in India; Ensign Tom Hosley of Raleigh, N. C., and Edward Hosley, in the navy at Corona hospital, California. She had two great grandchildren, Frederick and Robert, sons of Ermel Hosley.

RECLAMATION PLANK ASKED IN PLATFORM

CHICAGO, June 24 (AP)—A strong plank favoring postwar, self-liquidating irrigation and reclamation projects for the arid and semi-arid west will be asked by the republican platform-writing subcommittee on western and Pacific problems, Lowell C. Parget, Portland, Ore., chairman, announced.

Other matters which a smaller drafting committee headed by State Sen. Harry Wall, Chelan, Wash., was asked to whip into a resolution or plank for presentation later to the convention's platform drafting committee include:

Opposition to federal "encroachment" on control of western streams, "in the guise of declaring them navigable waters," and timber, fishing, mining, livestock, sugar beets, wool and poultry issues.

Other members of the western subcommittee include: E. E. Robertson, Juneau, Alaska, and Mrs. Rose Mayes, Idaho.
