Captain Dorsey Bailey of the West Virginia state police said: "We are certain to find more bodies." Relief work was reported in good control.

Plasma Sent

Hospitals all over West Virginia sent blood plasma to Shinnston and other allotments was flown to the city from Charleston, the capital. Almost too thunderstruck to realize what had happened, hundreds of homeless men, women and children waited around in stricken communities until the dead, the dying and the injured could be cared for.

Nazis Claim Prisoners Shot

LONDON, June 24 (AP)—Adolf Hitler's headquarters announced tonight that German prisoners had been reported "murdered" in Normandy and declared that "10 American soldiers will be shot for every German if the reports proved true." The broadcast statement followed by only a few days various reports from allied soldiers that both American and Canadian soldiers had been shot down by German forces who had taken them prisoner.

Attack Devastating

Renewing close support of invasion troops in France, American Marauders escorted by Thunderbolts smashed down German gun positions near Cherbourg with 250 tons of explosives. Crews of the medium bombers said the results were devastating. The big push against Cherbourg went into its third straight day with American infantry fighting within sight of the port's docks. On the eastern wing of the Normandy beachhead, the British swung into action.

CIO Wins in NLRB Election Here

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP) Designation of the CIO International Woodworkers of America, Local 6-12, as the bargaining agent for production and maintenance employees of Klamath Pine Co., Klamath Falls, Ore., was announced by the national labor relations board today. Of the 17 employees voting at an election May 17, nine chose the IWA, four the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers, and four voted for neither.
