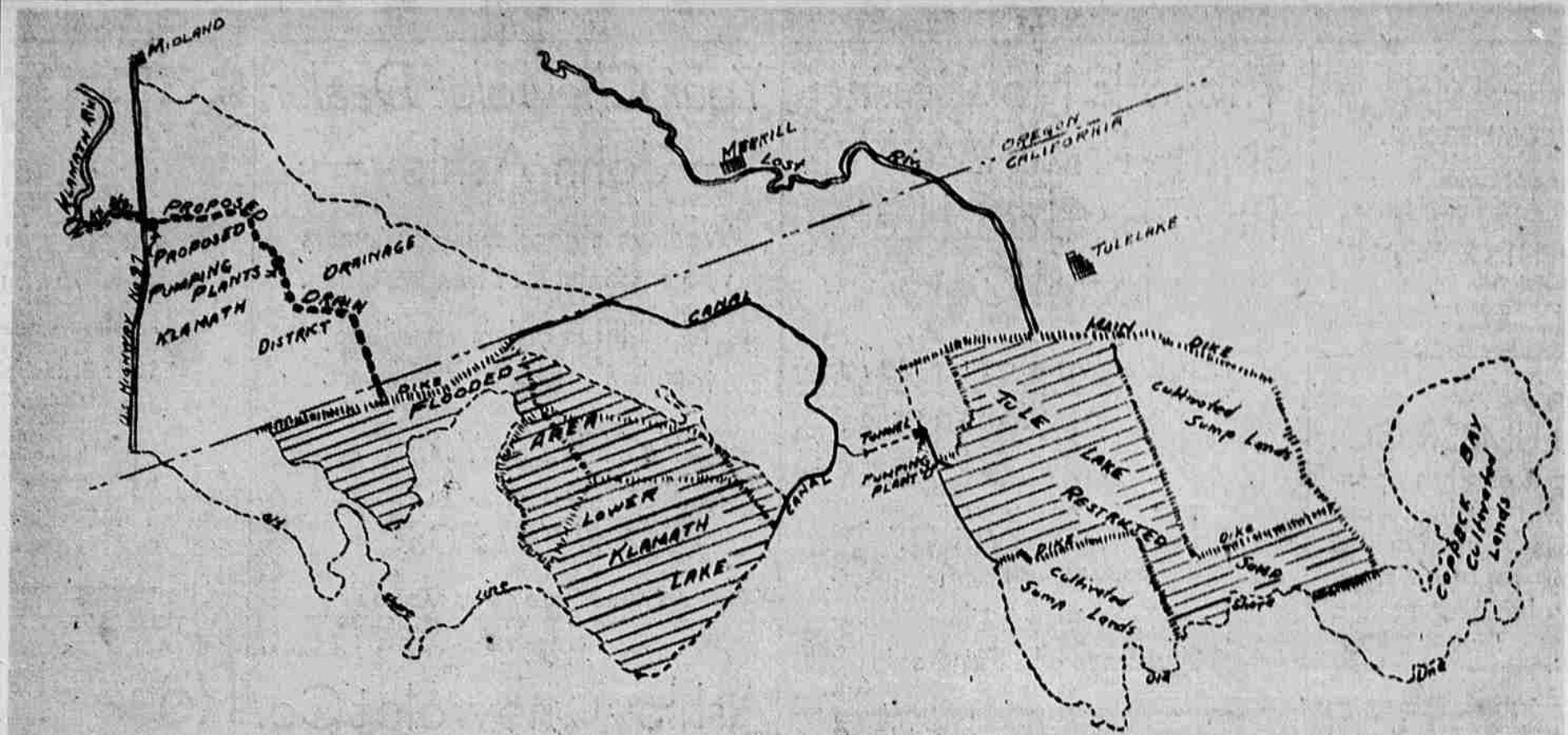
COMMISSION TO MEET

SALEM, June 26 (AP)—State police during May arrested 1582 persons and warned 3832 others for motor vehicle law violations, fines and sentences for the offenses totaling \$13,271 and 1340 days in jail.

There were 35 arrests for drunken driving and 101 for speeding. The officers arrested 300 persons for crimes against persons and property, including 36 for livestock theft, 58 for larceny, and 10 for sex offenses.

SERVICE MEN'S WIVES ENLIST

More wives of service men are now enlisting in the WAVES than at any other time in the history of this women's service of the navy in Oregon, which indicates the over-all popularity of women in the armed services among men in uniform, according to Specialist Dan Schreiber of the Klamath Falls navy recruiting station which handles WAVES applications in this area.

Latest enlistment reports for Oregon show that 27 percent of recent groups of young women departing for the WAVES indoctrination school at Hunter college, New York City, are married women whose husbands are in the armed services. A year ago, only 3 percent of the enlistments were women with husbands in uniform.
