Babe Tries to Straighten Drives Before Pro Warm-Up

CHICAGO, June 26 (AP)—After winning the women's western open golf championship—her second in four years—Babe Didrikzen Zaharias was trying to straighten out her power drives today before showing her shots to the country's leading pros.

She will be matched with a top-ranking professional in the pro-women's feature Wednesday of the Chicago victory national tournament. Many of the contestants in the women's western will compete in the meet at the Edgewater golf club—and Babe may finally come up against some one she can't out-drive.

The pro-women's, pro-amateur and pro-senior affair will be 36 holes, and serve as a tune-up for some 50 of the best available golfers before they start their 72-hole medal play Friday for the victory national championship.

You can bet that most of the spectators will be wanting to see Babe's shots—and may pass up

such stars as Ben Hogan, Sammy Byrd, Byron Nelson, Jug McSpaden, Jimmy Demaret and Craig Wood to get a glimpse of the 30-year-old athlete who jumped into prominence during the Olympic games of 1932.

Babe averaged nearly 265 yards on her drives Saturday in beating Dorothy Germain of Philadelphia 7 and 5 for the women's western title. Although her tee shots were long, many of them found their way into the rough, and it was only because of her remarkable powers of recovery that she was able to whip up a wide margin of victory over the 1943 western amateur queen.
