Four File as KUHS Coach; Many Interested

Four men have filed applications or asked for them while many others have shown definite interest in the position of coaching the Klamath Union high school athletic teams next fall and winter.

Those who have filed are Delbert S. Scott of Ontario, Ore.; H. W. Bowers of Astoria; Marcus Cook of Coeur d'Alene, Ida.; and Kernal Buhler of Vale, Ore. Scott filed primarily as a physical education instructor and not much is known at the moment about his coaching career. The same is true of Buhler.

H. W. Bowers is the head coach at Astoria high school. He is known principally for his basketball teams which have almost always been in the state tournament, winning the title on several occasions.

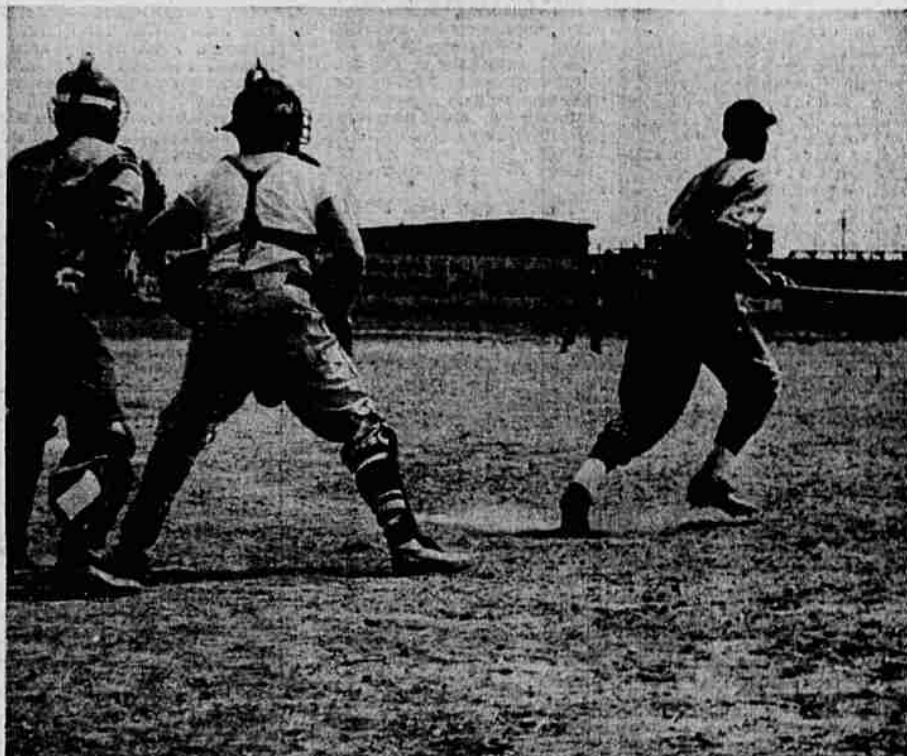

Success of 5th War Loan Will Meet Acclaim of Men in Field and Prove Nation Is Backing Our Armed Forces

"In moments of crisis involving the safety of our native land, the American people have invariably rallied against the danger with courage, faith and resolution.

"For the past two years we have been in one of these crises, perhaps the greatest in our history. On the battlefield and on the home front men and women are daily making great sacrifices so the freedom in our way of life may be preserved.

"There is now in progress the 5th War Loan Drive to raise money so as to insure that this conflict will be brought to the speediest possible conclusion and with the



least loss in lives. The complete success in the drive will meet the acclaim of the forces in the field and will be renewed proof that all Americans are one solid phalanx of determination in this great war.

"All of us profoundly trust that soon the world may be restored to a just peace. Until we can, with God's help, bring about that happy realization of our dreams, each of us must seek incessantly for ways and means by which the value of our services to our country may be enhanced. Right now we can do so by buying bonds. Let's make this particular victory a quick and decisive one."

Swimming Tank Open Over Fourth

Civilians, Servicemen to Swim During Four-Day Holiday; No Classes

The natatorium will be open to high school students, adults, and servicemen over the holidays, from July 1 to July 4 inclusive, Dave Bridge, city recreation officer, announced today.

There will be no swimming classes for the grade school children who have been taking lessons on Monday and Tuesday of next week, Bridge said, but the regular schedule will be resumed on Wednesday, July 5.

One hundred and twenty-nine people of high school age and over went swimming at the pool on last Saturday and Sunday. This figure includes many servicemen in uniform who got in for half price.

The pool will be open from 1 p. m. to 8 p. m., and from 7 p. m. to 10 p. m. during the holidays and for the rest of the summer on weekends.

Swimmers are urgently requested to bring their own suits and towels, especially towels, as only a limited number are available and these are mostly used by uniformed servicemen who have for the most part no swimming equipment.

The price of admission is 50 cents except to men in uniform who get in for half price, or 25 cents.

Notre Dame Wins College Title

TOLEDO, O., June 27 (AP) — The University of Notre Dame today won the 1944 National Intercollegiate Golf team championship by a one stroke margin over the University of Minnesota.

The last man to finish the qualifying round—Robert Terry—brought the victory to the Irish. His 76 gave Notre Dame a four-man team total of 311. Minnesota had 312 and Michigan, the

pretournament favorite, wound up third with 318.

James Jackson, of Washington University, St. Louis, was the individual medalist with a two over par 73.
