Postwar Highway Bill On Slate

SALEM, June 28 (AP)—The federal post-war highway bill, under which Oregon would receive \$12,000,000 a year for three years, will be considered by con-

gress immediately after it reconvenes on August 1. State Highway Engineer R. H. Ballock said today on his return from Washington, where he attended the meeting of the executive committee of the American association of state highway officials.

Ballock said he is preparing the Oregon plans to spend the state's share.

Electricity Bills On Decrease

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—A continued downward trend in average municipal residential rates for electricity is shown in a federal power commission sur-

vey of 200 cities having populations of 50,000 or more.

The survey, based on rates effective January 1, 1944, showed that Tacoma, Wash., again led the nation's largest cities, its municipal plant having the lowest residential rates for bills of 40, 100, 250 and 500 kilowatt-

hours, at \$1.10, \$1.70, \$3.20 and \$5.30 respectively.

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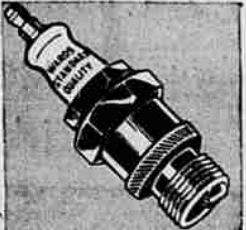

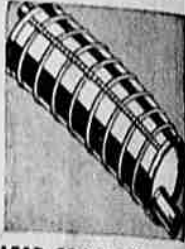

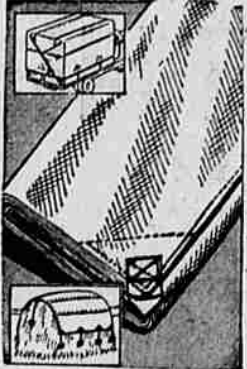
