NEW TRAFFIC CONTROL UNIT INSTALLED

The first unit of Western Pacific railroad's centralized traffic control signal system, now being installed on its line through the Feather River canyon, California, was placed in operation Sunday afternoon, June 25. This is the 25-mile section between Portola and Spring Garden. At the present rate of progress, the operation will be extended early in July to include the 15 miles between Spring Garden and Keddie.

When completed, the centralized traffic control system, installation of which was begun last October, will embrace 117 miles of line between Portola, at the upper end of the Feather River canyon, and Oroville, western gateway to the canyon. The total cost of the project, which will be one of the longest operations of its type in the United States, will be approximately \$1,300,000. It is expected that the project will be completed the latter part of this year.

Under the new signal system (called the CTC), movements of all trains in the district will be directed by a dispatcher from a central tower, strategically located at Keddie, 76 miles east of Oroville. Trains will be directed only by signal indication, without train orders, and all passing track switches on the entire district will be electricaly opened and closed by remote control from the main control board at Keddie.

SWITCHMAN INJURED AFTER SAVING LIVES

PENDLETON, June 28 (AP)—Roy L. Blake, about 55, railroad switchman, is in a critical condition at a local hospital today after saving the lives of an unidentified young girl and middle-aged man who was riding the child on the handlebars of his bicycle. A backing switch engine was about to run down the pair at an intersection in Pendleton yesterday afternoon, when Blake

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dashed in front of the locomotive and shoved them aside. He was hit before he could leap to safety and rolled under the engine footboard. His pelvis was fractured, bladder ruptured and other internal injuries inflicted. The man and girl left the scene before anyone could learn their names.
