

NAZI SUPPORT RUSHED FROM FATHERLAND

will make a coordinated major counterthrust."

Marshal Von Runstedt apparently had become convinced at last, that the big allied effort is coming from the present beach-head.

With the Americans around Cherbourg having wiped out all resistance except at a six-to-seven mile tip of Cap de la Hague northwest of the port, the allies were holding approximately 1100 square miles of French ter-

ritory, and a coastline of 125 miles.

Prisoners Taken

German prisoners in the hands of the Americans taken since D-Day had mounted to 30,401, and a headquarters announcement said Nazi tanks destroyed or disabled since the invasion now totaled 292.

Of these 121 were destroyed. These figures did not include late battle reports of the past few hours when heavy tank fighting was taking place around Caen.

Field dispatches said the Germans at Cap de la Hague apparently were determined to make a stand along the Vauville-Beaumont Hague-Greville line where they had 20 to 30 tanks, about 3000 troops and two 280 mm. railway guns. These troops were being supplied by air at night.

But a fort a mile off the Cherbourg harbor on Ile Pelee had given up.

Passenger cars are being scrapped or retired at the monthly rate of 150,000.

Minsk drove within 37 miles of the White Russian capital to-day pushing the Germans swiftly back over the same road to Warsaw and Berlin which Napoleon followed in his disastrous retreat from Moscow.

Hand-Like

Like a hand grasping hand, the red army reached for Minsk while artillery and bombers blasted a way for the ground forces.

The hand-like soviet offensive was formed by units fanning out to the northeast of Minsk like fingers, while strong groups southeast of the city formed the thumb.

Direct Route

With the freeing of Mogilev the Russians for the first time in nearly three years have a direct rail route between Leningrad and Odessa.

Field dispatches said the Germans had retreated from this area so quickly they had had little time to damage the rail line.

Main Thrusts

The three main thrusts at Minsk were: down the old Smolensk-Warsaw road; over the Bykhov-Minsk highway across the middle of the Gomel-Minsk railway and highway.

Red army troops on the Smolensk road reached the upper Berezina north of Borisov, near the actual place where Napoleon, with his staggering remnants, made a crossing at the village of Studenky. Here advanced units were 27 miles northeast of Minsk and Borisov appeared as good as gone.

falling back to a new defense line somewhere in Poland.

THE big tank battle at Caen, where the British are fighting to widen our toe-hold on the coast of France, continues unabated.

It is announced today that we now have 1100 square miles of the soil of France. That is about one-half of one per cent of France's total area of around 212,000 square miles. (The area of France is a little better than twice the area of the state of Oregon.)

If you want a mental picture of the ground we've won so far in the invasion, try to visualize an area 11 miles long by ten miles wide.

It isn't much. But you must remember that we're ONLY BEGINNING.

LUMBER RECRUITING SERVICE STARTED

In an effort to alleviate the shortage of lumber and mill workers in this area, the U. S. employment service has started a positive recruiting program in the middle west which would bring workers from that part of the United States to Klamath county and other parts of this state where they are needed.

Ottis Thompson of the employment service here is now in the middle west working as lumber labor recruiter. An attempt will be made to secure men from seven mid-western states, including Oklahoma, Arkansas, Missouri, Nevada and Louisiana. These states seem to have a surplus of lumber help.

The program as yet is just in its early stages, according to Jack Almetzer of the local employment office, but definite results are expected soon. Labor recruiters from two other Oregon lumber areas have gone east to work on the project.

DEMOS COMMENT ON DEWEY SPEECH

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—Democratic members of congress reacted today to Gov. Thomas E. Dewey's speech accepting the republican presidential nomination with such criticism as "demagoguery" and as lacking "an understandable program."

Comment in the capital came largely from democrats, few republican congressmen being in Washington.

"He says they want to end one-man rule," commented Senator Murray (D-Mont.). "I don't know of any one-man rule and I have been here ten years. A man who plays that kind of demagoguery is unfitted for the presidency at this critical period in our history."

Senator Davis of Pennsylvania, one of the few republicans available, said:

"With triphammer blows of truth, Tom Dewey brought home

to our people the grave and fundamental issues which lie before America today. America now knows it has found in him a leader whose ability, vigor, strength and determination will turn back the tide of rampant and irresponsible bureaucracy."

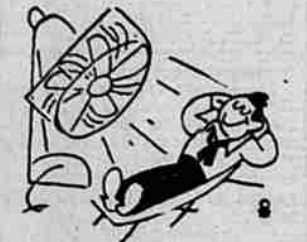

Dewey Hopes to Confer With Leaders of Party

grapher who had snapped a shot after the other picture-takers had agreed not to make any more shots.

Wide Range

Dewey covered a wide range of issues in answer to questions. He said he had read the republican platform only once—while he was en route here by plane—and that "it represents my views."

Referring to Dewey's promise to gather young men around him, a reporter discharge Secretary of State Cordell Hull.

"You are asking me to pass on the mental vigor of Mr. Hull," Dewey replied. "I will not do that. I am not engaging in cabinet-picking at this time."

Satisfied

The nominee expressed satisfaction with the foreign trade plank of the party platform. While stating that some persons thought it might have been better, Dewey said it should be recognized that the platform was drawn by persons with conflicting opinions, and that as a result there had to be some compromising.

"This was totally an unbossed convention," he declared. "The delegates were free to reach their own decisions."

Inconsistent

Parts of the foreign trade plank may appear, at first blush to be inconsistent, he said, recalling that the plank promised an "adequate protective tariff" on competitive products designed to assure American standards.

"The essence of the plank is to be found in the latter part," Dewey said. "The party promises that this nation will work with other nations to promote greater trade. This is not inconsistent with the tariff part of the plank."

Foreign Policy

Questioned closely about his views on post war foreign policy, Dewey said he did not believe the United States should surrender its "sovereign right to make war" to any international organization.

"The sovereign power to make war is primarily a defensive power on our part," he declared. "We have never fought any offensive war."

Mexican War

"How about the Mexican war?" a reporter asked.

"That depends on your interpretation," he said.

The nominee defended state regulation of insurance companies at length, and promised a negro reporter that he would live up to his oath to enforce the 13th and 14th amendments if he is elected.

Emergency hospital attendants said Pearce apparently was the victim of a heart attack.

SALEM, June 29 (AP)—William H. Fredericks, 30, Jefferson, was killed early today when his bicycle was struck on the Pacific highway eight miles north of here by an automobile driven by Otto Mahoff, Salem.

State police said the bicycle was unlighted. Fredericks was employed at a Woodburn cannery.

The young pickpocket described his specialty as women's handbags. He said he had been traveling through the southwest and through Klamath Falls, Salem and Oregon City for the last two months.

German Casualties Heavy In France

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, June 29 (AP)—American doughboys have killed 5000 to 6000 Germans and captured 37,333 since the landings in France, a staff officer said today.

With the normal ratio of wounded to dead, it appeared obvious that the Germans had suffered extremely heavy casualties in trying to stem the American drive from the beaches in the last 24 days.

The officer said the Americans had buried 3941 enemy dead and that the Germans had buried many of their own.

AFL Unions Swell State Bond Figures

PORTLAND, June 29 (AP)—Investment of \$350,000 in war bonds by American Federation of Labor unions swelled the state's fifth war loan total today to \$51,830,000, which is 41.4 per cent of the quota.

Three hundred and fifty-one union locals in the state invested reserve funds in the bonds.

drive down the Canton-Hankow railway, an offensive designed to bisect China and make difficult the supply problems of both the Chinese army and the American air force. The communique reported attacks at a dozen different points along the railway and in the vicinity of Hengyang.

Woman Pleads Guilty to Charge

SAN DIEGO, Calif., June 28 (AP)—Mrs. Helen McDermott Kreger, 23, formerly of Vancouver, Wash., pleaded guilty to charges of child-stealing yesterday afternoon for the abduction of 2-year-old Rita Mae Lucero from a clothing store Monday and was remanded to superior court for sentencing. She was held in jail in \$500 bail.

She testified she took the child to claim as her own when her marine husband returned from the South Pacific. He was unaware of their own child's death at birth.

Postwar Commission Reports to Snell

SALEM, June 29 (AP)—The state postwar commission reported to Governor Snell today that \$70,000,000 is available for postwar projects, enough to employ 36,000 men at \$1800 a year for one year.

The commission said that 36,000 men is one-third of the estimated unemployment immediately after the war.

Besides the amount of money available, many more millions are expected from the federal government and other agencies.

Bomber Makes Belly Landing

PENDLETON, June 29 (AP)—No crewmen were injured when a B-26 medium bomber type training plane from Pendleton field made a forced belly landing in a field a mile east of the base this morning.

Announcement of the accident was made jointly by Col. David Wade, commanding officer of the Walla Walla air-drome, and Major Albert F. Claus, in charge of the Pendleton sub-base.

Cause of the mishap is being investigated by an army air force board.

WINTER GRAINS BEGIN TO RIPEN

PORTLAND, June 29 (AP)—Winter barley ripened in some of Oregon's warmer areas last week, and winter wheat is beginning to ripen, the weather bureau reported today.

The weekly crop-weather survey showed good prospects for winter and spring grains, despite some local drought damage, frost damage in parts of Lake county, and a small acreage cut down by rain and wind. Corn improved during the week.

With the strawberry season approaching its close, cherries began moving to market. Growers in some regions, particularly around The Dalles, reported cherries heavily cracked by rain.

The orchard picture: apricots and early peaches approaching maturity; nuts set well; apples and pears developing satisfactorily except for some pear scab.

Gerhardt Former Trainer of Coast's 91st Division

CAMP WHITE, Ore., June 29 (AP)—Major Gen. Charles Hunter Gerhardt, commander of the 29th infantry division in Normandy, is the man who reactivated the Pacific coast's famed 91st division.

World War II's version of the 91st—the "wild west" outfit of Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho and Montana men which was cited by five American and French commanders after 1918—was trained here by Gerhardt.

Gerhardt left to command the 29th division after exactly a year here.
